#### <u>Salty, Not Sweet</u> Rabbi Richard Hidary

Leviticus 2:11 legislates an enigmatic law: "No leaven or honey may be offered by fire to God." Sefer Hinukh writes: "The reasons for this commandments are extremely hidden – even to find a small hint." Nevertheless, many have ventured various theories for this prohibition.

Rambam conjectures that ancient idolaters used leaven and honey on their sacrifices but not salt; therefore, the Torah polemically commands the opposite to distance ourselves from paganism. However, modern archaeology does not support Rambam's assessment of pagan sacrifice. In any case, one needs to explain why the Torah rejects some aspects of pagan sacrifice but not others.

Sefer Hinukh explains that by not offering leavened bread, which takes a long time to rise, we will learn to be zealous and prompt in our service of God. Prohibiting honey teaches us not to pursue empty calories and quick-fix materialism but rather healthy sustenance and long-term fulfillment.

Ibn Ezra precedes the anthropologist Mary Douglas in insightfully connecting the use of leaven and honey in the process of bread making. Ancient bakers did not use processed yeast but rather kept fermented sourdough in a cool place. When they were ready to bake they would mix this leaven into their dough together with something sugary, like date honey, to activate fermentation. This process leads to swift growth in the dough as the yeast teems exponentially. However, fermentation is also a process of slow decay that eventually destroys its host food. Moreover, unlike fermentation of wine that preserves the grape juice for many years before turning to vinegar, bread spoils after just a few days.

Combining aspects of each of the theories above, we can juxtapose the prohibition against leaven with the requirement to add salt mentioned just two verses later: "You shall season your every offering of meal with salt; You shall not omit from your meal offering the salt of your covenant with God; with your offerings you must offer salt" (Leviticus 2:13). Salt acts as a preservative. Cured meat can last for years without refrigeration, as the ancients knew. The significance of adding salt to the sacrifice is made explicit in this verse by calling it א-להיך ברית מלח ברית מלח ברית מלח ברית מלח ברית מלח ברית מלח salt of your covenant with God. The phrase Ts:19; Ezra 4:14; and 2 Chronicles 13:5) to mean a long-lasting and unchanging covenant even when not describing a food. When we offer a sacrifice to show our own devotion to God and the covenant of the Torah, we must add salt to signify the permanence of that commitment.

Unlike salt that preserves, leaven causes decay. Leavened bread looks impressive in the short term but very soon deteriorates and spoils. Coming close to God through a ritual act should not be a pro forma display like a big loaf full of hot air. Rather, it should be simple, modest, sincere, and long-lasting, like an unleavened matza that can stay fresh indefinitely.

Connecting this insight from the Parasha with the Maftir of Parashat HaHodesh, we can understand the requirement to eat matza with the Passover sacrifice and the prohibition against leaven simply as another instance of the general rule that applies to all sacrifices. However, on Passover, we remove the leaven from our residences and from our diets completely for the entire holiday thereby transforming our homes into sacred Temple-like spaces and recognizing ourselves as a nation of priests. This intense experience should keep us away from fleeting leaven-like materialism and instill within us the matza-like permanence of the Torah's teachings. As we recall the bitter slavery of Egypt and our salty tears under oppression, we thank God for turning those sour memories into sweet salvation
