Dots and Doubts

Parashat Nitsahim begins with all of the Israelites gathering to enter into a covenant with God before entering into the Land of Israel. If the covenant is not kept and the Israelites worship other deities, then God will bring curses upon the people and drive them from the land. The last verse of the chapter (29:28) reads:

הַנְּסְתָּרֹת לִיי אֱלֹהנוּ וְהַנְּגְלֹת לְנוּ וּלְבַנֹּינוֹ עד־עוֹלִים לְעַשׁׂוֹת אֶת־כְּל־דְּבְרִי הַהּוּוְרֹה הַזְּאֹת:

The secret things belong unto the LORD our God; but the things that are revealed are for us and our children forever, that we may do all the words of this law.

The plain meaning of the verse in context appears to be that God will punish those individuals who break the covenant secretly – but sins committed in public must be dealt with by the people (i.e. in the courts.)

One of the striking things in this verse are the 11 puncta extraordinaria [extra dots] over the words "to us and our children" לָנוּ וּלְבְנִינוּ . These markings are an ancient scribal notation indicating a doubt or error in the text. Frequently these dots were used to indicate that certain letters should be deleted.

Deleting the words "for us and our children" in our text would very drastically change the meaning to "Hidden acts concern the Lord our G-d, as well as Public ones...(therefore) the entire Torah must be observed forever."

Rashi (based on the Talmud) gives the plain meaning of the verse above (that the People are responsible for bringing public sinners to justice) but then adds that the dotted words are there to teach us that responsibility for adjudicating public transgressions of the Torah was only meant for a future time after the Jews had settled in Israel.

A very different homiletical explanation for the dots was given in *Bemidbar Rabah* (III,13.) According to this Midrash the dots indicate that if we properly perform the precepts that God has revealed, then He will reveal to us those things that are hidden and secret. Interestingly, this interpretation is very similar to that of the Dead Sea Sect as indicated in the *Damascus Covenant*.

A different explanation of our verse is brought by Nahmanides, one which is appropriate for the days leading up to Rosh Hashanah. According to Nahmanides, the hidden things refer to those transgressions that we are unaware of having done (or those done by accident.) The word "Nistarot" being used as it is in Psalm 19: אַנְינְאוֹת מִּיכְּינִרוֹנְ מִנְּטְתְּרוֹת נְּבֶּנִייְ מִנְּסְתְּרוֹת נִבְּנִייְ מִנְּסְתְּרוֹת this errors? Cleanse me [Lord] from hidden faults. Only God can understand why we err. But we must take responsibility for those actions and transgressions which we knowingly make, and we must bear the consequences of our transgressions.

One late Midrash (Abot de Rabbi Nathan) explains that Ezra placed the dots above words because of some doubt and that it would take Elijah to sort out the correct text. Ezra said: If Elijah should happen to come to me and ask, "Why did you write these words?" I shall answer him, "I have already put dots over them." And if he should say to me, "You have written this well," I shall remove the dots.

It seems that the true meaning of the dotted letters and the verse itself has become one of those "secret things" for which we hope to receive a divine explanation.

However, by mishnaic ordinance one can transfer those debts to a bet din (Jewish court) through a mechanism known as pruzbol and thereby continue in the year to come to collect what is owed. Rabbi Soloveichik will discuss the pruzbol in his Shabbat morning lecture; a pruzbol form will be handed out in synagogue and should be handed in or emailed to
