(continued from back panel)

At the Southern border of Canaan with Egypt, near Gaza — This is, after all, the shortest and most direct route from Egypt to Canaan. Nahum Sarna and others suggest that based on an alternate reading of Eusebius, *Goren haAtad* be identified with *Beth Eglayim* in the South of Israel. This is the well-known site of *Tel el Ajjul*, a major Egyptian center during the late Bronze age and extremely close to *Deir el Balah*—which was a center of Egyptian burial practices in Canaan. In 1993, Aaron Demsky posited that *Abel Mizraim* is cognate with *Nahal Mizrayim* (i.e. the stream of Egypt) and is identifiable as the southern border of Canaan also known as *Nahal Besor* (near Gaza). Demsky also suggested that "*beyond the Jordan*" doesn't refer to the Jordan River, but rather a city called Jordan located in the Negev which is written as *y-w-r-w-d-n* in the Pharaoh Shoshenq I's topographical list from the 10th c. BCE, and later mentioned by Josephus in the first century CE, and still later in a Christian Syriac source.

The Torah goes out of its way to tell us the original name, general location, and what the locals called the place where Jacob was eulogized. Wherever this location was actually located, Jacob's seven day funeral was a major event—not only for the Children of Israel, but also for Egypt, and indeed for the entire region.

LOCATING GOREN HAATAD: WHERE DID JACOB'S FUNERAL TAKE PLACE? —Z. EDINGER, SHAMASH—

Gen. 50:7: So Joseph went up to bury his father; and with him went up all the officials of Pharaoh, the senior members of his court, and all of Egypt's dignitaries, (8) together with all of Joseph's household, his brothers, and his father's household; ... (9) Chariots, too, and horsemen went up with him; it was a very large troop. (10) When they came to Goren ha-Atad, which is beyond the Jordan, they held there a very great and solemn lamentation; and he observed a mourning period of seven days for his father. (11) And when the Canaanite inhabitants of the land saw the mourning at Goren ha-Atad, they said, "This is a solemn mourning on the part of the Egyptians." That is why it was named Abel-mizraim, which is beyond the Jordan.

This description of the location of Jacob's funeral ceremony contains several unusual, ambiguous, or problematic elements:

Goren haAtad literally means the "threshing floor of the brambles." Although called a "threshing floor," this must have been a specific place of some significance for the funeral cortege to stop there to eulogize Jacob for seven days. It is not mentioned elsewhere in the Bible.

Beyond the Jordan" - עבר הירדץ - this term normally (but not exclusively) refers to the East Bank of the Jordan river, i.e. the Transjordan. If this is the case, then Jacob's funeral cortege took a very strange and circuitous route, not travelling along the direct route up the coast (i.e. בישרנים) but rather crossing across the Negev, up the plains of Moab into the Transjordan, stopping at *Goren HaAtad* for seven days, and then crossing the Jordan river over into Canaan in order to bury Jacob at Machpelah near Hebron. Moreover, verse 11 indicates that the location of *Goren haAtad* was in Canaan, how could it be both in Canaan and also be "beyond the Jordan"?

<u>Abel-Mizraim</u>: Verse 11 also gives us an ancient etiology of the name of a place called *Abel Mizraim*. In doing so the Torah links this place with the mourning ceremonies for Jacob. But the word Abel (אָבֶל) is not actually connected linguistically to the word for mourning (אָבֶל). Abel refers to a stream or meadow, and there are several place names in the Bible using this term (*Abel Bet Maacah*, 1 Sam 20:18; *Abel Shittim*, Num. 25:1; *Abel Ceramim*, Jud. 11:33; *Abel Mehola*, 1 Kings 4:12; *Abel Mayim*, 2 Chron. 16:4). Our masorah is careful to record the place name as *Abel* with a *qamats* and not with a *tsere*, thus retaining the meaning of stream/meadow even as the verse connects this place name with mourning.

Based on these ambiguities several different locations have been proposed for the location of Jacob's funeral and the place called *Goren haAtad*.

In the Transjordan — Our verses state more than once that the location was in עבר הירדן which normally would mean the Eastern bank of the Jordan river. This is the opinion of the medieval commentary of Sekhel Tob (12th c. Italy). Critical bible scholars of the 20th century even go so far as to claim that Jacob was buried in Jordan! G.I. Davies has suggested that the archeological site of Tell es-Sa'idiyeh in Jordan, at which a large complex of Egyptian burials were found, is the likeliest site for the biblical Abel Mizraim.

The Jordan Rift Valley (West Bank) either near the Egyptian center of *Beth Shean*, or, following Eusebius (4th c. Bishop of Caesarea,) *Beth Hogla* (South of Jericho) — According to Hizkuni (12th c. France), עבר הירדע is in Canaan (i.e. the Cis-Jordan). Yehuda & Yoel Elitzur prefer this identification, and suggest that עבר הירדע could be a metathesis of ערבות הירדע and refer to the *Arabah* region (*Ever haYarden* from *Arvot haYarden*, cf. II Sam. 15:28). (continued on side panel)
