DEBAR TORAH: THE EMERGENCE OF A PROPHET —HAZZAN RABBI IRA ROHDE—

Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I set you apart; I appointed you as a prophet to the nations. Alas, Sovereign Lord," I said, "I do not know how to speak; I am too young." But the Lord said to me, "Do not say, 'I am too young.' You must go to everyone I send you to and say whatever I command you"

(Jeremiah 1:4-7, Sephardic Haftarah for Parashat Shemot)

Parashat Shemot spends a lot of the story talking about the emergence of Moshe as a Prophet. Indeed, it can be asked why the Torah wants us to know such details of the Prophet Moshe's life as his having been hidden from persecution by his mother and his having been raised by Pharaoh's daughter. I mean, if God chooses to give men prophesy, couldn't a prophet have emerged from more ordinary circumstances? And yet we see, over and over, that the prophets often arise out of special circumstances, as Jeremiah and Samson, to mention just a few, were chosen and designated to be prophets "from the womb."

With Moshe we have the emergence of a different kind of leadership in Israel: prophetic leadership. Shemot begins with a repetition of the Tribal names, the prolification of Israel in Egypt, and their enslavement and persecution. Perhaps the very mention of tribes at the beginning of Shemot is implying a reminder to us that precisely here at this point the tribal leadership completely broke down. Not that the tribes had gotten together so well before, although at the end of Bereshit they seemed to have patched up differences.

But the tribal leadership didn't protect them from slavery. The fact that midwives and other women have to save the few babies they can may also be critiquing the failure of the traditional male political leadership. And in the end, it wasn't the tribal leaders who got them out of Egypt; rather, it was this new type of figure, a prophet. True, Moshe and Aaron come to be leaders of the Tribe of Levi. And later, the Prophet Joshua is in fact a tribal leader of Ephraim. But Moshe's leadership derives not from his tribal connections; rather it comes from his special status as a prophet.

And since the prophet's leadership is solely dependent upon God, indeed, miraculous, we often find stories which make the prophet depend upon God and His miraculous deliverance for his very coming into existence. The prophet's power depends upon and derives from God's Revelation of His Word and Ways to him. The prophet is God's spokesman, and no one else's. Pharaoh is used to being able to use his own authority over magicians and priests, but the Divine authority who commands Moses and Aaron will submit to no other. Among the Israelites, other forms of leadership may still be necessary, but they must carry out the Word of God revealed to the prophet. The many special stories told about the prophets' lives buttress their claims to a unique authority, an authority which can even challenge the normative authority of nations and their kings. It is true that Joseph and Jacob have prophetic visions, but they interact in more normative roles of political leadership. Our *parasha* is the first which begins to carve out this unique authority and role of prophet.
