

YESH TIKVA: INFERTILITY AWARENESS SHABBAT

This week is Parashat HaHodesh, when we add a special reading about the Paschal sacrifice brought by the Israelites in Egypt just before the Exodus (Exodus 12:1-20). Each household is instructed to sacrifice a lamb, place some of its blood on the doorpost, roast its meat, and consume it at home that evening leaving nothing left over. This sacrifice would later become the centerpiece of the annual holiday commemorating the Exodus. This sacrifice is what gives the holiday its name—Pesah.

Passover is arguably the most well known and widely celebrated Jewish holiday. It is a time of celebration with family and friends. Its unique home ritual commemorates the Paschal sacrifice and includes a strong educational component that focuses on children and re-telling the story to the next generation.

It is important to remember during this time of year, amidst all our preparations and anticipation for celebrating with our families - that some of us may find all the attention on family and children to be bittersweet, even painful, for not all of us are blessed with having children and raising a family. For those struggling to conceive, the words וְהַגַּדְתָּ לְבִנְךְ בַּיּוֹם "You shall tell your son that day"—can be especially painful.

For this reason, Shearith Israel along with many other synagogues throughout the country have chosen this Shabbat to raise awareness about infertility and its emotional impact in our community. This communal effort has been organized by Yesh Tikva, an organization that provides support to those affected by infertility. Yesh Tikva provides practical and emotional tools to help those affected by infertility, including publishing guides to medical information, halakhic issues, and other resource guides for infertility, organizing support groups, creating platforms for sharing personal stories, and organizing events to raise awareness and sensitivity.

Yesh Tikva aims to increase awareness and sensitivity among those who have not struggled to have to children and to equip them with resources to help and support those who may be suffering in silence. We hope you will take a few moments to learn more about these issues.

One of the halakhic rules related to the Paschal sacrifice is that if a family is too small to fully consume a whole lamb on Passover Eve, they must partner with a neighbor and combine their households celebrate the Passover together. This rule is ostensibly made to prevent any of the sacrifice from being leftover and becoming waste. But it also adds a social element to the holiday. Passover is meant to be celebrated with one's family - but we must also make sure that everyone is included. Only by opening our homes to others and bringing our households together can we properly celebrate. Increasing our sensitivity and awareness for those in need, including those struggling in silence with infertility, will help make this Passover a time of celebration for all.
