ENCLOSED BUT OPEN AT THE HEART — HAZZAN RABBI IRA ROHDE—

"He made the enclosure: On the south side, the twined linen hangings were 100 cubits long, held by 20 poles and 20 bronze bases, with silver pole hooks and bands. The north side was also 100 cubits long, held by 20 poles, with 20 bronze bases, and silver hooks and bands. On the west side, the curtains were 50 cubits wide, with 10 poles, 10 bases, and silver hooks and bands. The east end, toward the sunrise, was also 50 cubits wide. Curtains 15 cubits long were on one side of the entrance, with 3 poles and 3 bases, and curtains 15 cubits long were on the other side of the entrance to the courtyard, with 3 poles and 3 bases" (Ex. 38:9-15)

Although it may be hard for us to picture, the majority of the tabernacle compound in the desert was enclosed open space. The Hatzer, often translated as "courtyard," but also translated as "enclosure," took up most of the area. Fabric "hanging curtains" held in place by pillars, hooks, sockets, and pegs, served as a fence/wall/partition around this rectangular enclosed courtyard, measuring 100 X 50 cubits, or let's say 150 X 75 feet. Within this enclosure/courtyard, mostly towards one side, there was a "tented" section which was covered over, let's say about 45 X 15 feet. The "tented" section consisted of two parts: the "Holy Place" section, with the showbread table, the Menorah, and the Incense Altar, plus the additional section called the "Holy of Holies." But most of the Tabernacle compound simply consisted of the Hatzer, the uncovered but fenced-in "yard" area. Critically, that was where the sacrificial altar was located, near the center of an area in front of the "tent." And it was in this outer "courtyard" with its altar that most of the activity of the Tabernacle took place.

In the later Temple, the open "courtyard" area for sacrifices came to have other "chambers" around it, not just a fence or wall. But still, the open-to-the-sky "courtyard" with its sacrificial altar remained the most active part. Of course, if you want to barbecue, you need good air to burn as well as good ventilation, and that alone is reason enough to require the open-air space.

But perhaps there is a lesson to be learned as well: For the heart needs enclosures, fences, and partitions. The heart must be protected. The heart also needs gates and entranceways to pass through and purify it. But the heart also needs to be open, most especially to the sky: its aspirations, its hopes and dreams. Many religious structures symbolically signify the Created World, and, of course, even our Little Synagogue has a sky-blue ceiling! But the original Created environment intended for Man, the Garden of Eden, had both this openness to the sky, but was also called a "garden;" i.e., it was enclosed and tended. As it says in Song of Songs 4:12: "You are a garden locked up, my sister, my bride; a spring enclosed, a sealed fountain." But the Garden was also open, open to the sky, and from thence, open to the Four Corners of the World.
