Creation and Kashrut Rabbi Dr. Richard Hidary

"The entire purpose [of creation] consists in bringing into existence the way you see it everything whose existence is possible."

- Maimonides, Guide of the Perplexed, III.25

Aristeas, an official in the Ptolemaic government in Egypt in the 3rd cent. BCE, was sent to the high priest Eleazar in Jerusalem on a mission to hire seventy-two sages to translate the Torah into Greek. Upon meeting the high priest, Aristeas first asked him a question that we still wonder about today: "Since there is but one creation, why are some animals regarded as unclean for eating, and others unclean even to the touch?" (Letter of Aristeas, 129) If indeed, as the Psalmist says, "Mine is every animal of the forest" (50:11) then why should Leviticus 11 list some of His creations as impure and abominable? Eleazar explains to Aristeas that the abominable status of non-kosher animals is based on their behavior. Kosher animals and birds are herbivorous, living up to the ideal diet laid out for them in Genesis 1:29-30, where all humans and animals were commanded to eat only fruits and vegetables. Animals that have split hooves lack claws necessary to catch prey, and chewing cud is only necessary for eating grass that is more difficult to digest than meat. However, this criterion does not apply to fish who are not herbivorous, even those with fins and scales.

The anthropologist Mary Douglas offers a new approach in her book, Leviticus as Literature. She notes that the label -"שקץ" abominable" applies not to impure land animals but rather only to ""swarming things." While many commentators (including Eleazar the high priest) consider these creepy crawlies to be abominable because humans find them disgusting and menacing, Douglas points to their fruitful abundance to be precisely what makes them wonderful. After all, God commands the waters to "bring forth swarms of living creatures" (Genesis 1:20) and God further gives them a blessing to increase and fill the waters in the seas.

Therefore, the reason why we may not eat non-kosher fish and seafood is not because they are disgusting but rather precisely in order to protect them. The Torah says only that they should be considered "abominable to you," not that they are in any way scorned by their Creator. Surveying dietary laws of other cultures, Douglas points out that animals are often forbidden as food precisely because they are held in high esteem. Since these swarming creatures are fulfilling their very purpose in creation, we are forbidden to interfere in their continual productivity. As an accommodation to the human need to consume some sea food, the Torah does permit some fish to the Israelites: those with protective scales and fins for effective means of locomotion. We can consume some of these protected fish without worrying about blunting their fertility, but we must keep away from fish that lack such protection.

The Torah's dietary restrictions pave a middle road towards a healthy and respectful coexistence between us and the animal kingdom. We are not Jains who go out of their way not to harm even the smallest insect, nor are we free to exploit and plunder nature as we desire. Humans are created "a little less than angels" (Ps 8:6) and therefore masters over all other species. Yes, we are permitted to use and consume other living beings, but we are also responsible to care for the natural world and recognize their rightful place as part of the diversity of God's manifold Creation.
