(continued from back) Leviticus 12:3 interrupts the impurity laws to mention circumcision in order to teach that a boy's entering into the covenant through this powerful ritual releases the mother from her impurity. Rabbi David Zvi Hoffman further explains that the rite of circumcision cuts the time of impurity for the mother of a boy to be half that of a girl. That leaves the mother of a girl with a two-week impurity period while, as Rabbi Moshe Shamah suggests, her eighty-day waiting period may symbolically parallel to the boy's eighth day circumcision and thus represents the girl's entrance into the berit.

In contrast to Jubilees, this explanation takes the Torah's law as particular to Bnei Yisrael, rooted in historical circumstances, malleable according to human activity such as circumcision, and addressing human psychological needs. Although the etiology in Jubilees may lend the law a sense of pristine perfection, it also removes the ritual from this world to a different primordial realm. With the rabbinic and anthropological understanding, however, we can appreciate the human application of these laws to our own lives and societies. Even though we no longer have sacrifices or keep these laws of impurity, the lessons that we should deny irrational fears, pursue psychological health and perform covenant affirming rituals remain as relevant as ever, especially during cycles of transition and new beginnings.

Perashat Tazria`: Postpartum Impurity Rabbi Dr. Richard Hidary

Across ancient cultures, a mother who just gave birth is considered impure, likely because of the life that just parted from her, the bodily fluids that she lost, and the danger involved in childbearing. Modern medicine calls this state postpartum depression, which usually subsides within a couple of weeks. It is therefore not surprising that the Torah (Leviticus 12) prescribes rituals for when and how to purify the new mother. What does require explanation, however, is the length of the waiting period. After giving birth to a boy, the mother is impure for only seven days and is then pure for all purposes except that she may not enter the sanctuary until the fortieth day. If she has a girl, then the mother is impure for 14 days but must wait until the eightieth day to enter the sanctuary. What is the source for these numbers and why should the number of days for a girl be double those for a boy?

The earliest extant interpretation is found in the Book of Jubilees 3:8-12, which connects this set of laws with the beginning of Genesis. It calculates that Adam was created during the first week of creation while Eve was created during the second week. It further adds, with slight scriptural support, that Adam was kept in the land where he was created for forty days before being brought to the Garden of Eden, while Eve waited for eighty days before entering the Garden of Eden. This interpretation models the birth of every human to the creation of primeval man and woman and further parallels the Tabernacle to the Garden of Eden thus creating a cosmic bond between divine and human creations. Jubilees concludes: "And for this reason the commandment is written on the heavenly tablets in regard to her that gives birth." For the author of Jubilees, the Torah's laws are embedded in nature from the beginning of creation and are therefore universal, eternal, immutable and absolute.

The Rabbis, who reject the book of Jubilees, sought various psychological explanations for the different impurity periods for boys and girls (Bavli Niddah 31b) and relate it to the joy in performing circumcision. A little anthropology can help shed light on the details. Other ancient cultures also had a longer period of impurity for a girl than for a boy. The Hittites, for example, required the mother to offer a sacrifice one week after giving birth. They also deemed a male child impure for three months and a female child impure for four months. Interestingly, Aristotle as well as Rabbi Ishmael (Mishnah Niddah 3:7) wrote that it takes forty-one days for a male fetus to form completely and eighty-one days for a female.

The similarities to the Torah are striking, but the differences are even more important. Unlike the Hittites, the Torah places no impurity on the child but only on the mother, perhaps focusing on her psychological state rather than seeing the child as a source of irrational fear. Second, the Torah delays her sacrifice until long after her impure state is completed in order to render impossible any magical fertility rites that were common in the ancient Near East during that period. Lastly, the Torah transforms the waiting periods into covenantally significant numbers that are multiples of 7 and 8.
