Security Update in the Aftermath of Poway

In light of another violent attack on a synagogue, we wish to reassure you that Shearith Israel is committed to ensuring the safety of worshippers during services and visitors to our building. Our synagogue has professional armed security present on Shabbat and Holidays and there is always someone at the door whenever the building is open. We are in regular contact with the head of our contracted security firm and have reviewed and strengthened our policies. We recently met with the head of NYPD's Clergy Outreach Unit and developed and trained our staff on security and emergency response procedures. We continue to review and enforce our procedures to ensure high levels of security and best practices for the safety of our congregants, guests, and visitors.

We are working on improving our physical infrastructure. Just a few years ago we were awarded a homeland security grant that enabled us to install new surveillance equipment and to train our staff on active shooters and other high risk situations. We have now been awarded a grant that will harden our entrances and enable lockdowns. This will take time but is already in progress.

With our fellow Jews from around the world, we mourn the horrific murder of Lori Gilbert Kaye, Hashem yikom damah, and pray for the Chabad of Poway community, and for a refuah shelemah for all those injured in the attack.

AHARE MOT: THE HEBRA HASED VA'AMET — Z. EDINGER —

Chapter 16 of Leviticus begins by reminding us of the deaths of Nadab and Abihu, two of Aaron's sons who were killed after bringing an unsolicited sacrifice in the Tabernacle (back in chapter 10). It is a strange way to start our parasha which deals mainly with the rituals of Yom Kippur. The opening verses can be understood in a number of ways. One interpretation is that after the deaths of his sons, Aaron was anxious about having to serve inside the Tabernacle. Therefore, he is now given very precise instructions on how to avoid the same fate that befell Nadab and Abihu. In this way Aaron is able to resume his duties as High Priest.

The opening of this week's parasha gives us an opportunity to revisit the story of the deaths of Nadab and Abihu. Moses instructs two of Aaron's cousins, Mishael and Elzaphan to remove the bodies from the Tabernacle to a place outside the camp (and presumably to bury them.) They are instructed to handle the corpses by carrying them in their tunics. The great Rabbi Akiba posited that it was Mishael and Elzaphan who later inquired of Moses what they could do regarding the Paschal sacrifice which they missed on account of being impure from having handled a corpse (Numbers 9:6). Their inquiry was made out of an earnest desire to bring the Paschal sacrifice, and for this they are given a special remedy enabling them to bring the sacrifice a month later on "pesah sheni."

It is fitting then, that on this week of *Aharei Mot*, immediately following Passover, we have an opportunity to recognize the holy work of the *Hebra Hased Va'Amet*, our congregation's burial society, sponsors of this week's kiddush. Like Mishael and Elzaphan, the Hebra Kadisha, or Holy Society, are intimately involved in the preparation of the deceased for burial and related tasks. In our community these tasks are performed by the *Hebra Hased Va'Amet* - literally the Society of Faithful Kindness (a name that reflects the words used by Jacob when he asked Joseph to make arrangements for his burial in the Land of Israel Genesis 47:29).

The work performed by the burial society can be difficult, unsettling, and inconvenient. Nevertheless, the men and women who perform the tahara provide a dignified service to those who are no longer living. They do so with devotion and respect and without expectation of reward or recognition.

Beyond the holy tasks associated with *tahara* the Hebra also provides the Meal of Consolation (Seudat Havra'ah) served to mourners upon return from the cemetery, and it helps arrange for meals or other needs of the family during the week of Shiba'h.

With dignity and quietness, the Hebra also helps pay for the burial of the indigent. Burial fees cost many thousands of dollars and can quickly become a significant burden on families in grief who do not know how they will be able to afford to bury their loved one. In these cases, the Hebra ensures that everyone in our community will be able to have a dignified burial

The Hebra also helps the congregation in a myriad of smaller ways; by sponsoring communal events and ceremonies at Beth Olam and at our historic cemeteries, by supporting the upkeep, maintenance, and repair of the cemeteries, and by helping sponsor a variety of events at the synagogue.

The Hebra was founded in 1802 and is the oldest extant Jewish philanthropic organization in New York today. It is still active and completely led by volunteers. On this Shabbat Aharei Mot, let us recognize the contributions of the Hebra Hased Va'Amet to our community.

Don't Forget to Count Sefirat haOmer!

Shearith Israel has two "'Omer Boards" which predate the Mill Street Synagogue of 1730. They are used in the synagogue to count the seven weeks between Passover and *Shabuot*. This is based on Leviticus 23:15, which instructs us to count 50 days from the offering of the new barley sacrifice on Passover until the holiday of *Shabuot* when the

new wheat was offered. The measurement of the offering was called an "'Omer," and from this unit of measurement comes the name used for this seven-week period. The letters H, S, D found on the boards stand for the *Homer* (H is an archaic way of transliterating the Hebrew letter 'ayin), S for Semana (weeks), and Dia (days). The boards have been used annually for nearly 300 hundred years.
