Leviticus 26:18 states:

:וְאַם עַד אַלֶּה לֹא תִּשְׁמְעוּ לִי וְיָסַפְתִּי לְיַסְּרָה אֶתְכֶם שֶׁבַע עַל חַטּאתֵיכֶם And if, for all that, you do not obey Me, I will go on to discipline you sevenfold for your sins.

Our parasha states that if Israel does not learn its lesson after receiving the punishments in this chapter, then their sentence will be multiplied sevenfold. Divre Hayamim thought that the retribution of Israel was over after just 70 years. Daniel, however, saw that because they had not yet repented, the period of their domination would continue for 490 years. Nevertheless, both authors derived their calculations by combining Jeremiah's prophecy with the details of this parasha.

Considering that Hasmonean rule proved to be short lived, and the Second Temple too was destroyed, various authors and thinkers have continued to analyze these prophecies to calculate a still future date for the Messianic salvation. However, the most important lesson we can gain from this parasha and from Jeremiah is that our redemption depends not on a set calculation but rather on our own actions and our ability to fulfill the terms of the covenant. This is a lesson especially relevant on this Shabbat, as we celebrate on Yom Yerushalaim and the ongoing miracle of the State of Israel. May we all have the merit to live in the land in peace and prosperity.

Fulfilling Prophecies Rabbi Hidary

Among the long list of consequences in this parasha for disobeying the laws of the covenant, is one punishment that reverberated through the history of the Jewish people for many centuries. Leviticus 26:34-35 states:

אָז תִּרְצֶּה הָאָרֶץ אֶת שַׁבְּתֹעֵיהָ כֹּל יְמֵי הָשַׁמֶּה וְאַתֶּם בְּאָרֶץ אֹיְבֵיכֶם אָז תִּשְׁבַּת הָאָרְץ וְהָרְצֶּת אֶת שַׁבְּתֹעֵיהָ: כָּל יְמֵי הָשַׁמֶּה תִּשְׁבֹּת אֵת אֲשֶׁר לֹא שֶׁבְתָה בְּשַׁבְּתֹתֵיכֶם בשבתכם עליה:

Then shall the land make up for its sabbath years throughout the time that it is desolate and you are in the land of your enemies; then shall the land rest and make up for its sabbath years. Throughout the time that it is desolate, it shall observe the rest that it did not observe in your sabbath years while you were dwelling upon it.

As retribution for not fulfilling the commandments, including and especially the land sabbatical every seventh year, Israel will be expelled from the land. Sure enough, when Judah was exiled in 597 and 586BCE, the author of Chronicles saw their banishment as a fulfillment of these verses, as stated in Divre Hayamim 2 36:20-21:

וַיֶּגֶל הַשְּׁאֲרִית מִן הַחֶּרֶב אֶל בָּבֶל וַיִּהִיוּ לוֹ וּלְבָנֶיו לַצְבָדִים עַד מְלֹדְ מַלְכוּת פָּרָס: לְמַלֹּאות דְּבַר יְלְנָק בָּפִּי יִרְמְיָהוּ עַד רָצְתָה הָאֶרֶץ אֶת שַׁבְּתוֹתִיהָ כָּל יְמֵי הָשֵּׁמָּה שבתה לִמלֹּאות שבעים שנה:

Those who survived the sword he exiled to Babylon, and they became his and his sons' servants till the rise of the Persian kingdom, in fulfillment of the word of the LORD spoken by Jeremiah, until the land paid back its sabbaths; as long as it lay desolate it kept sabbath, till seventy years were completed.

Interestingly, the last verse also connects the return of the Judeans to their land in 539BCE under the Persian Emperor Cyrus as a fulfillment of a famous prophecy by Jeremiah in 20:10:

כִּי כֹה אָמֵר יְתֹּוֶק כִּי לְכִּי מְלֹאת לְכָבֶל שָׁבְעִים שָׁנָה אָפְקֹד אֶתִבֶם וַהַקְמֹתִי עֲלֵיכֶם אֶת דְּבָרִי הַטוֹב לְהָשִׁיב אָתָכָם אֶל הַמֶּקוֹם הַזֶּה:

For thus said the LORD: When Babylon's seventy years are over, I will take note of you, and I will fulfill to you My promise of favor—to bring you back to this place.

If we do the math, we see that the First Beit Hamikdash stood for about 410 years; add to that approximately 70 years of exile comes to around 480. Therefore, the total number of sabbatical years during this period was nearly 70. Considering that Bnei Yisrael did not fulfill this and other laws during this period would explain why the land needed to be empty for 70 years in Jeremiah's calculation.

To add one further calculation that extends the above prophecies well into the Second Temple period, we can look to Daniel 9:2:

אֲנִי ֻדְּנַיֵּאל בִּינַתִי בַּסְפָּרֵים מִסְפַּר הַשָּׁנִים אֲשֶׁר הָיֶה דְבַר־יִקֹוָלְ אֶׁל־יִרְמְיֶה הַנָּבִיא לְמַלְּאות לְחָרְבִוֹת יְרוּשָׁלַם שִׁבְעִים שֶׁנָה:

I, Daniel, consulted the books concerning the number of years that, according to the word of the LORD that had come to Jeremiah the prophet, were to be the term of Jerusalem's desolation—seventy years.

Daniel inquires of God to know the proper way to compute the 70 years of Jeremiah's prediction. At the end of the chapter, the angel Gabriel reveals to him that Jeremiah's prophecy actually meant not 70 years but rather 70 weeks of years, coming to 490 years. Historians explain that Daniel saw the true fulfillment of Jeremiah's prophecy in rise of Hasmonean rule, the first and only period of independence from foreign domination during the Second Temple Period.

Still, we wonder, how can Daniel interpret Jeremiah's clear words, "70 years," as 70 sabbatical cycles? The answer may lie back in our parasha.
