The Tithe-Confession: An Unusual Temple Prayer Z Edinger

This week's *Parashah* begins with a special formula to be recited when giving the First Fruits (*Bikkurim*) in Jerusalem. This formula is well known to us as the base text used tell the story of the Exodus in the *haggadah*. Our para-

us as the base text used tell the story of the Exodus in the haggadah. Our parashah then gives us a second and much less well known formula to be recited in Jerusalem after giving the Tithes.

Deut. 26: 12 When you have concluded tithing a tenth part of your yield—in the third year of the Tithe cycle - and have given it to the Levite, the stranger, the orphan, and the widow, that they may eat their fill in your settlements, 13 You shall declare before the LORD your God: "I have cleared out the consecrated portion from the house; and I have given it to the Levite, the stranger, the orphan, and the widow, just as You commanded me; I have neither transgressed nor forgotten any of Your commandments: 14 I have not eaten of it while in mourning (beOni), I have not cleared out any of it while I was unclean, and I have not given any of it to the dead. I have obeyed the LORD my God; I have done just as You commanded me. 15 Look down from Your holy abode, from heaven, and bless Your people Israel and the soil You have given us, a land flowing with milk and honey, as You swore to our fathers."

While the rabbinic rules of tithing can be complex, the basic system is

While the rabbinic rules of tithing can be complex, the basic system is fairly straightforward. A portion of one's annual produce is taken and given to the Priests (*Terumah*.) From the remainder of the produce, a portion is then given to the Levites (Ma'aser Rishon – the First Tithe.) A second tithe is then taken - which is to be consumed by the owner in Jerusalem (Ma'aser Sheni.) Every three years in the cycle - the Second Tithe is not consumed by the owner, but rather is given to the poor (Ma'aser Ani.)

The declaration in our parashah is recited after the completion of each third year in the cycle – this is called by the Rabbi's "Viduy Ma'aser" - the Tithe -Confession. This declaration is quite unusual for many reasons. Verse 14 stands out in particular as requiring explanation. "I have not eaten of it while in mourning (beOni), I have not cleared out any of it while I was unclean, and I have not given any of it to the dead." Why are these three items mentioned at all? What is the significance of this list of things that were NOT done?

Based on Talmudic sources – Rashi interprets the three clauses as pertaining to the Second Tithe. They are specific halakhot related to the sanctity of the Second Tithe. I have not eaten of it while in mourning – because it is consecrated produce (Kodashim); I have not taken it while unclean – because that would render it impure; I have not given it to the dead – not literally to the dead, but rather I have not sold this holy produce to perform the mitzvah of burying the dead— because the tithe produce is itself holy and cannot be used for any other purpose – no matter how important.

A very different explanation is given by Rashbam. He believes that the first clause has nothing to do with mourning. Rather the Hebrew word beOni (from the root A-V-N) should be understood as in Job (20:10) or Hosea (12:9) to refer to 'stolen goods.' Thus the verse should be rendered "I have not inappropriately embezzled the Tithe by eating it myself" and does not relate to mourning at all.

I propose that a plain reading of the three clauses of verse 14 does NOT refer to the Second Tithe eaten by the farmer in Jerusalem, but rather to the Poor Man's Tithe (*Ma'aser Ani*). The purpose of these three clauses is to assert that every single bit of the tithe has been made available to feed the needy. (1) I have not eaten any of it myself; (2) I have not prevented anyone in need from partaking of it by rendering it impure. (3) *I have not given it to the dead*, literally, meaning that I have not wasted any of it by pouring it on a grave. <sup>1</sup>This declaration is made to show that not only did the farmer take tithes, but that the entire tithe was made available in full to those in need of it.

<sup>1</sup>In ancient times this was a common near eastern practice, called kispu in Akkadian. It was still known in Israel during the Second Temple period (See the apocryphal works of Sirach 30:18 and Tobit 4:17.)
