

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

LUMINANCE IN THE GULAG-AND IN OUR OWN LIVES

Rabbi Dr. Meir Y. Soloveichik



The lighting of Hanukkah candles is one of the most powerful images in Judaism, and with Hanukkah approaching, it is appropriate to ponder this ritual's symbolism and

significance. In his magnificent memoir, *Fear No Evil*, Natan Sharansky describes his persistence as a "Prisoner of Zion" in a Russian gulag. During the Hanukkah season, he was denied the right to kindle candles in his cell, and went on a hunger strike in response.

Hauled before the Soviet soldier that oversaw the prison, Major Osin, Sharansky explained that he would cease his hunger strike if he were permitted to light his holiday candles in the Major's office. The memoir describes what unfolded next.

I arranged the candles and went to the coat rack for my hat, explaining to Osin that during the prayer he too must stand with his head covered and at the end say 'Amen.' He put on his major's hat and stood. I lit the candles and recited my own prayer in Hebrew which went something like this: "Blessed are You, God, for allowing me to rejoice on this day holiday of our return to the way of our fathers. Blessed are You, God, for allowing me to light the candles. May You allow me to light candles many times



in your city, Jerusalem, with my wife Avital, and my family and friends."

I added, "And may the day come when all our enemies, who today are planning our destruction, will stand before us and hear our prayers and say 'Amen'."

"Amen," Osin echoed back.

Ner Hashem nishmat adam, we are reminded in Proverbs; the soul of man is the candle of God. It is so easy to take life's most fundamental gifts for granted. Sharansky's sacrifice for a few candles is a potent reminder that in the darkest of times, in the coldest of places, the light of Judaism endured because we never forgot what was truly precious: to observe the Torah with our loved ones, family friends, to "return to the ways of our fathers," to reflect the light of Jerusalem, and of the Torah, in our own lives. As we light the *neirot* this year, may its luminance remind us of what is most important—and what truly gives light to our lives.





RONALD STANTON REFLECTION

in his note to me, "no synagogue has ever had a better friend." For me, as for so many of us, it was a personal loss. My family's friendship with Ronald's goes back to Ronald and his mother Hedi's first days in the United States.

But here I would like to elaborate on what Peter meant about Ronald being the synagogue's best friend. Nothing concentrated the mind like entering Ronald's office for a meeting of the Ministerial Committee, which Ronald chaired. Ronald demanded clarity, and his patience was tested if you danced around the facts or avoided the obvious. By the time the meeting was over, you had a goal, a plan to achieve it, and Ronald's support.

From the founding of our Congregation, we have never had a more generous, consistent, or determined supporter. Remarkably, Ronald's support was unqualified. Once satisfied with the integrity and soundness of the Board or the Committee's deliberations, Ronald



never attached strings. He understood that for the Congregation to thrive, resources were needed as well for day-to-day functioning as for our more exciting long-term challenges. There was one exception to the "no-strings" policy: Ronald always conditioned a portion

of his support on shared fundraising support from the community. He understood that we all needed to accept responsibility for the Congregation's health, including its financial well-being.

Ronald never forgot his experience as a refugee, when he came to this country from Nazi Germany, nor the love with which our synagogue embraced him and his mother. While Ronald's major gifts and projects around the City are known to all of us, less well known is how, quietly and steadily over the years, he gave support to family after family in our community when they needed it. At Ronald's insistence, they never knew his identity, for he never wanted to be thanked. He preferred the private satisfaction of returning the kindness shown to him years before.

I will miss Ronald, and our Congregation will miss him. How fortunate we were to have a friend like Ronald.

Ingredients

4 boneless fish filets (halibut, snapper)

1-2 onions chopped

2 or 3 garlic cloves chopped

1 red pepper cut into thin strips

2-3 carrots cut in slices

1-2 dried red chili peppers (according to taste)

Bunch fresh cilantro chopped

1/4 tsp turmeric

1/3 cup olive oil

Heaping tbsp paprika

Salt and pepper to taste

1 1/2 cup boiling water

Directions

Saute onion, carrots, red pepper and chili peppers in a wide deep skillet in olive oil (use just enough oil to coat pan) until soft.

Add fresh garlic, cover and continue cooking.

Pour boiling water into pan. Sprinkle paprika, turmeric, salt and pepper.

Cut fish filets in few pieces.

When boiling add fish filets to pan covered.

Add cilantro or parsley. Cook on low flame for 20 minutes.

CEMETERY TOUR HIGHLIGHTS HISTORIC TIES OF THREE CONGREGATIONS

Congregation Shearith Israel has long been a model of comity between Sephardim and Ashkenazim and between orthodoxy and other denominations – and that was nowhere better on display than in a recent pre-High Holiday tour of the synagogue's Beth Olam cemetery in Queens, led by our Shamash Zachariah Edinger.

Symbolizing that harmony, the tour was organized in conjunction with Shearith Israel's cemetery partners, Congregation B'nai Jeshurun and Temple Shaaray Tefilla. The event began with a special "Geniza"

service to bury ritual objects from the respective synagogues. This was led by Rolando Matalon, Rabbi of Bnai Jeshurun and by our hazzan, Rabbi Ira Rohde.

Attendees from all three congregations then listened attentively as Zachariah Edinger, together with Robert Kanter of BJ, led a tour of the grounds, describing

the lives and achievements of some of its notable residents. Among them: Israel Bear Kursheedt, born in Germany and a student of Natan Adler, he was "assuredly the most learned Jew in America in the early decades of the country," said Shamash Edinger. He also symbolized the ties between communities, marrying the daughter of Gershom Mendes Seixas of Shearith Israel, serving as president of our congregation, and later becoming one of the founding members of B'nai Jeshurun.

Other notable stops on the tour included: Uriah P. Levy, the first Jewish commodore of the U.S. Navy who was instrumental in banning the flogging of sailors, the poet Emma Lazarus, the exquisite Arnheim mausoleum (Bnai Jeshurun), and the grave of movie producer Sam Spiegel.

We also visited Three Civil War era ministers, with opposing views during the Civil War: Rev. Samuel Isaacs of Shaaray Tefila (anti-slavery); Rabbi Morris Raphall of Bnai Jeshurun (pro-slavery); And, Rev. Jacques Judah Lyons, minister of Shearith Israel (pro-Union but conspicuously silent on the topic of slavery).

The morning ended with memorial prayers in the "metaher house," the small chapel designed by Calvert Vaux, co-architect of Central Park.

The September 11 tour was the last of a special three-part series about our historic cemeteries. On April 13, historian Marena Wisniewski described what she learned in her recent research of the cemetery and talked as well about the unique partnership and historical ties among the three synagogues. She also discussed some of the cemetery's architectural and

historical gems and efforts to be undertaken for much-needed restoration work.

Part Two of the series took place May 22 with the annual visit to our Chatham Square Cemetery, Shearith Israel's first burial ground, in what today is Chinatown. The ceremony, honoring members of our congregation who participated in the Revolutionary War, was punctuated by a special color guard. In attendance were military veterans, clergy, and members of the community who placed American flags at the graves of our 22 veteran congregants. The cemetery was active from 1682 until 1823.

The Fast of Esther commemorates the day when the Jews of Persia donned sackcloth and ashes, went without food, and prayed that they be spared the massacre planned for them by Haman. Men don tefillin at the 5:30 service. Usually observed on the day before Purim, this year it is advanced to the previous Thursday because the Eve of Purim falls on Shabbat.

Purim commemorates the day when, through the intervention of Mordecai and Queen Esther, the Jews of Persia escaped being victims of Haman's evil plot to exterminate them.

Purim Shushan, the day following Purim, is the day Purim was celebrated in Shushan, the capital of ancient Persia, and in Jerusalem.
