FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

HANUKKAH'S ARCH-RIVAL

As we prepare to ritually remember the Menorah of the Temple, it is useful to ponder the most famous depiction of this ancient candelabra. The Arch of Titus depicts the triumphal return of the

Temple's marauders, with soldiers hoisting aloft the vessels of God's home in Jerusalem. Serving as an entryway into ancient Rome, proclaiming the Empire's triumph over Judea to all visitors, the arch and its image is seared into Jewish memory.

Yet this was not the only arch, or entryway, where a remembrance of the menorah could be found. The original obligation was to place the lamp on the outside of one's home, at the entrance, opposite the *mezuzah*. Even when Jews began lighting inside, many did so with the candles facing the *mezuzot* of the inner doorways. In this way, a home on Hanukkah was decorated with diverse mitzvot. Judaism thereby proclaimed that even stripped of sovereignty and scattered over the earth, Judaism could still survive, and ultimately endure, if every Jewish home was made into a tiny Temple. God may have been exiled from His home in Jerusalem, but He could take refuge in ours.

Over the centuries, the construction by triumphal arches continued. We know of others made in Rome; we are familiar with the Napoleon's arch in Paris, and the Marble Arch in England. All are expressions of empire,

manifestations of military might. Meanwhile, over the centuries, the Jewish creation of their own humble entrances continued as well; a *mezuzah* on the right and a hanukiah on the left. Consider the extraordinary contrast. On the one hand we have the proud entryways of emperors, on the other the doors of Jewish homes. And as every one of those empires ended up on the ash heap of history, it is *klal Yisrael* that remains. Thus did the doors of Jewish homes become the ultimate triumphal arches.

There was a tradition among the Roman Jewish community to refrain from walking under the Arch of Titus. In 1948, after the State of Israel's establishment was announced, the Jews of Rome walked under it freely for the first time in two millennia, but this time they walked in the opposite direction than that tread by Titus's triumphant troops, symbolizing the reversal of all the Arch proclaimed. Imagine the amazement of Titus, or of Vespasian, or Constantine, were they told that Jews had reestablished sovereignty over their land, reversed the effects of the Roman conquest, and have created a flourishing society speaking the language of their ancestors. It is indeed a miracle; and part of the reason Judaism survived was because the tiny temple that was the Jewish home was a fortress throughout the centuries, an edifice so seemingly insignificant, but ultimately so extraordinary that no empire overcame it.



On October 6, *Shabbat Bereshit*, we held a luncheon in honor of our *Hatanim*, Zachariah Edinger and Marc Wiznia. The luncheon was very well attended, and a good time was had by all. The delicious meal was catered by *Chef's Table*. Rabbi Soloveichik served as Master of Ceremonies and the *hatanim* were introduced by our Parnas, Mr. Lou Solomon. We heard words of Torah from Malka Edinger and Rivka Shoulson and (not so) short talks by both of the *Hatanim*.

During their speeches, the *Hatanim* both emphasized their commitment, as *hatanim* during this special 365th anniversary *Year of Years*, to helping support opportunities for lay participation and involvement at Shearith Israel. RETROSPECTIVE: S&P VOICES FROM AROUND THE WORLD

Members of Eight S&P Congregations Gather to Talk, Bond, and Sing

If you are a member of Shearith Israel or have attended services even just once, you can appreciate the specialness of our traditions. You may have thought it was unique — to be found nowhere else.

Happily, the good news is that we are not alone! In fact, throughout the world there exist several dozen Jewish communities that share in the same special history and traditions — if perhaps in their own local style and flavor.

In August, Shearith Israel had the unusual opportunity to bring together members of eight sister communities — perhaps the first-ever such gathering — for an engaging panel discussion as well as a little singing. Over the course of the evening, panelists had a chance to share with the audience (some 60 strong) a little bit about their communities, how they came into being, traditions they have kept, and also what the communities are like today — for happily, the Western Sephardi communities are not just historical memories but are living, breathing, active places engaged in the present and looking to the future.

The evening's panelists included:

- **Rene Samson**, former *Hazzan* of the *Esnoga* in Amsterdam, who grew up there;
- **Anna Ruth Henriques**, who grew up at the United Congregation of Israelites in Jamaica;
- **Raffaele Bedarida**, son of the esteemed *Hazzan* of the Livorno community, who grew up there;
- **Adam Jackson**, who grew up at the Lauderdale Road Synagogue in London, and is now an active member of Shearith Israel;
- **David Shahmoon**, who grew up at the Spanish & Portuguese Synagogue in Montreal and is now a member of Shearith Israel in New York;
- **Zachariah Edinger**, our learned and devoted *Shamash*, who grew up at Shearith Israel;
- **Jacob Oslick**, who grew up at a satellite service of Mikveh Israel in Philadelphia, was then an active member at Shearith Israel before venturing to New Jersey and to Mikveh Israel as a board member;
- **Vania Carvalho** from Recife, Brazil, home to a resurfacing Jewish community, from where Shearith Israel's founders once fled.



On August 13, Shearith Israel brought together — perhaps for the first time — members of eight sister S&P communities.

The panelists all expressed hope for renewing and strengthening ties among our sister S&P communities and holding future gatherings.

JUDAIC EDUCATION

ENTERING THE LAND: THE BOOK OF JOSHUA

Sundays, Through December 23 | 10:00 am
Rabbi David Silber

Tuition is \$275, but FREE for Shearith Israel members

Taught by Rabbi David Silber, this class carefully explores the book of Joshua from a literary perspective, examining core biblical questions: what does it mean to be a disciple, and how can a student turn into a teacher? Can anyone replace Moses? Does Joshua fulfill the Torah's commands about conquest of the land? What can this teach us about war and the possibility of peace?

Rabbi David Silber received ordination from Yeshiva University's Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary and is the Founder and Dean of Drisha Institute for Jewish Education. 

CULINARY CORNER

Ingredients:

- 4 eggs
- 1 cup shortening (margarine)
- 1 cup sugar
- 4 cups flour
- 1/2 tsp or less salt
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 2 tsp. vanilla (or more)
- Your favorite fillings, such as prune butter, mohn (poppy seeds), strawberry or apricot jam, chocolate chips, etc.

Instructions

- Mix all ingredients except for the filling. Refrigerate the dough at least 2 hours.
- Roll out dough. Using a cookie cutter or a glass, cut out rounds.
- Place around a teaspoon of your favorite filling in the center of each round.
- Fold rounds into a triangle shape.
- Preheat oven to 350 degrees and bake 10 minutes until just firm.
- Sprinkle powdered sugar on top.
- Store in the refrigerator.

If Caring Connection lacks the expertise or resources to provide appropriate assistance, they do their best to direct people to other congregational and communal organizations.




MEALS FOR MOURNERS AND NEW PARENTS

We add Deut. 25:17 – 19, which begins with the word “Zakhor” – “Remember [Amalek].” Haman, because of his wicked designs to exterminate the Jewish people, was thought to be a spiritual descendant of Amalek, the first presumed “annihilators” of the Israelites. Sephardic congregations everywhere mark the occasion with the reading of Yehuda Halevy’s poem, “Mi Khamokha,” as we do at 9:00 am as a prelude to Shahrit.



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
