FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Rabbi Dr. Meir Y. Soloveichik





An article in *Tablet* magazine by Simone Somekh describes the observance of Tisha B'Ab evening, as the mourners, suffused in darkness, hold candles so that the flames can provide a small source of illumination. The article concludes by discussing a striking tradition: "Each year, the Jews of Rome keep the stubs of the candles they use on Tisha B'Av, in order to use them a few months later to light the *hanukkiah*." This is, as the piece notes, a response to the fact that the most famous

depiction of the Temple's destruction is the menorah on the Arch of Titus in that very same city; thus Rome's Jews take "one step from destruction to reconstruction, year after year."

This is indeed true; but to this can perhaps be added. Both Tisha B'Ab and Hanukkah center, in a sense, on forms of fire. The Jewish day of mourning marks the Roman flames that consumed the Temple; in contrast, Hanukkah commemorates a miraculous form of fire that may not have consumed at all, defying time, burning brightly for much longer than the day's worth of oil would have allowed. In this, the lights of the sacred menorah were akin to the fire first encountered by Moses at Sinai, a flame that did not consume the bush from which it flamed forth. As David Gelernter once wrote, the miracle of the burning bush "is not the burning but the continued burning. Those dry thorns should have burned to black dust in an instant. But time has been stretched out, stretched thin, and a moment of instantaneous combustion lasts on and on." The flames encountered by Moses, and of the menorah, embody the flames of Jewish eternity.

The Hanukkah lighting of the Jews of Rome with the candles of Tisha B'Ab therefore can be seen as the ultimate response to a Roman empire reduced to ruins, as the light of Judaism continues to shine. As we light this year in Manhattan, and elsewhere in America, we would do well to think of the Jews of Rome, kindling with candles that superficially are reduced to stubs, but whose flames reflect the fire of Jewish faith, which has outlasted all attempts to extinguish it.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PARNAS

ALMOST LIKE BEING...

When we wrote to you over the summer, before the High Holidays, Covid-19 was causing a sense of fatigue, impatience, almost annoyance. I inveighed against the frustrated newspaper headline, "When Will This Ever End."

It is clear beyond peradventure that, as a community, we have made real strides since then. High Holiday services were wonderful for those of us who attended. We were not full, not even Covid-19 full, but we were nearly back to our ritual normal. Since then we have returned to observing nearly all our *minhagim*. Rabbi Soloveichik has been talking after Shabbat morning services, and *Friday Night Lights* is back, live and in-person, in all is magical glory. In trustee David Sable's words, with the return of live *Friday Night Lights* we have returned the majesty of Shabbat to the Upper West Side.

We are close to back to normalcy in other ways, too. Weekday services occur with regularity. The choir is back to where it used to be – in the choir loft. We are still masking indoors (at least as of this writing), but for many of us that has become a forgettable accoutrement of our attire – and in time that, too, like fedoras and bowlers, will become optional (it already is optional during outdoor and indoor classes and lectures).

As clear and welcome as these returns to normalcy are, what is a little less clear is where we go from here, or more precisely how fast can we return, fully and completely, to pre-Covid-19 routines. I have read much about how, for many, there are aspects of that earlier routine that people don't want to revert to. I do not have the sense that that applies to our congregational activities. Most congregants want a return to the familiar.

That is not to say we don't want to maintain some of the new and improved changes. I think it's fair to say that, as a community, we hope to continue some of the very positive things we learned from the experience. For example, Rabbi Soloveichik has a great radio voice. Ok, so maybe it's not Orson Welles narrating the H.G. Wells' War of the Worlds. But it's close - and it more than makes up in ideas and inspiration what it might lack in drama. We want him to continue to teach and lecture and inspire literally thousands of listeners (members and friends) with his virtual programming. We also learned that our outdoor space, our Paved Paradise, is a warm and genial place to hold services, classes, and kiddushim. For a part of the year, we trust that that, too, will continue.

Having said all that, there is one major item that is still missing from our weekly congregation life. The missing item is, well, you! It's like the Lerner and Loewe popular standard, Almost Like Being in Love; we are almost back to normal, but we are missing the key part. For those of us who are still not comfortable returning to even a socially distant crowd, please, continue to dial in. For the rest of us, who are comfortable returning to the theatre, the concert hall, to work and restaurants, please, come back home to us, too. We have such a special place, such a special minhag, and such a special role to play in the continuation of America Jewry. Do not let it die or even flag. Come back soon.

We are so pleased to see many of you returning to the city and to the synagogue. It's been uplifting to see more congregants joining us for services and programs outdoors, including Covid-safe kiddushim on Paved Paradise, and now that the colder season is upon us, prayers inside our wellventilated Main Sanctuary. We are especially gratified to see the expansion of our youth programming including perennial favorites such as: (Grand)parent-Child Learning & Pizza, Brunch & Learns with our clergy, weekly Jr. Congregation led by our own teen leaders, and special activities such as a visit to our local NYPD and FDNY for a spirited First Responder Appreciation Event. We are so grateful to our creative and energetic parent volunteers.

We hope many of you have noticed our newly restored front doors. To quote our member, Marc Wiznia, "A modern well-functioning door leaves a nice first impression."

And more important than good looks, is what you *can't* see that makes a huge difference. The restoration of our front doors was more than a "facelift." The new look is part of our "door and facility hardening" project that was funded by a Department of Homeland Security grant. After a painstakingly slow and Covid-stalled process of securing proper permits from the Department of Buildings and the city's Landmark Preservation Commission, and then supply chain delays, our project is now complete. Our synagogue has greater protective features thanks to

the "hardening" of our entrances, windows and offices, both inside and outside, while maintaining the aesthetic appearance we cherish.

On another note, as we prepare for the predicted cold and snowy La Niña season, our protective tent on Paved Paradise, will go into "hibernation," in its own protective indoor storage so that it's available for our use come Spring (and besides, sunny winter days on Paved Paradise are more comfortable without the additional shade). We look forward to the return of the "shade" and future enhancements in time for Pesah. But all of these measures involved ongoing costs. S&P Has Biggest Monthly Gain of Year

The New York Jewish community was surprised to learn of the incredibly rapid recent growth of The Spanish & Portuguese Synagogue, the oldest congregation in New York City.

Various reasons have been given but the consensus appears to be the dynamic leadership of the current Parnas (CEO) Louis Solomon is responsible for the phenomenon. When interviewed by this reporter, Rabbi Meir Soloveichik, the spiritual leader of the synagogue, confirmed that Mr. Solomon, a respected Wall Street attorney, had breathed new life into the 350-year old congregation using a weekly newsletter and a oncevacant lot next to the synagogue.

MAPPING THE GENETIC **IDENTITY OF BNEI ANUSIM:**

Rediscovering a Lost Jewish Community - The Role of Genetic Research

It happens surprisingly often: a person of Hispanic background investigates a quirky habit in their family – such as a grandmother lighting candles in the basement on Friday nights - and before long, they discover that they are likely descended from anusim, Iberian Jews who were forced to convert to Catholicism in the 15th and 16th Centuries of the Common Era.

Dr. Karl Skorecki, Dean of Bar-Ilan University's Azrieli Faculty of Medicine in Tzfat, has been a pioneer in the field of Jewish genetic research, beginning with his landmark genetic study of the Cohanim. His investigations are providing insights into the shared lineages among the diverse descendants of the Jewish Diaspora. Professor Skorecki's Bnei Anusim Project has opened to us a lost chapter in Jewish history – the fate of the anusim.

IN MEMORIAM: ALVIN DEUTSCH

Rev. Zachary Edinger

Shearith Israel mourns the passing of our honorary Parnas-Presidente Alvin Deutsch. Alvin became a member of Shearith Israel in 1972, was elected to the Board of Trustees in 1984, and became Segan (Vice-president) in 1991. He then served as Parnas-Presidente of Shearith Israel from 1997-2002.

Although Alvin attended services nearly every shabbat - few people knew that Alvin was also "dean of New York copyright lawyers" representing a veritable "who's who" of famous clients, and was himself an almost legendary figure among the intellectual property bar. He was a trustee of the Copyright Society of the USA, the Johnny Mercer Foundation, and the Goodspeed Operahouse. He also found time to serve as an adjunct professor of copyright at the Cardozo School of Law.

Alvin's professional accomplishments were often accompanied by quiet acts of kindness to others and religious devotion. Thus, while serving in the United States Army from 1954-1956, Alvin organized and led sabbath services for Jewish soldiers stationed with him in Ingrandes, France. During the 1970s and early 1980s, Alvin was involved in legal negotiations with the Soviet Union over copyright issues. He travelled to the Soviet Union on several

occasions; on these visits, despite being followed by Soviet authorities, he brought along prayer books or other religious articles, which he would leave in the Great Synagogue of Moscow.

In congregational life, he led quietly and unobtrusively, never wanting to put himself into the limelight. On several occasions, he accompanied our distinguished and elderly member, Dr. Moshe Carmilly, to events at the Institute for Hebrew and Jewish History at Babeş-Bolyai University in Cluj, Romania.

When he learned that one of our members had been diagnosed with a terminal illness, Alvin arranged for him to be honored as the Hatan Bereshit, an honor which was deeply meaningful for him, his family and for the congregation. And after his passing, Alvin checked in regularly with the family, having frequent breakfast meetings with his widow for years afterward. In fact, Alvin often had lunch or breakfast meetings with many congregants, always inquiring first and foremost about their lives and families. Alvin cared deeply about the lives of others and for the members of Shearith Israel.

In the long history of our congregation, Alvin will be remembered most for the planning, fundraising and restoration of our



sanctuary in 1997. It was a monumental undertaking that Alvin was instrumental in achieving. The result


was phenomenal. The incredible beauty of our sanctuary today is in no small part the result of the restoration which Alvin made possible.

When entering the sanctuary, Alvin would always pause and take a quiet moment to appreciate the dignified holiness of our sanctuary before walking to his seat. He loved the formality and grandeur of Shearith Israel's minhag, and revelled in all the small choreographic details of the Torah

service, always bowing, accompanying the Torah procession, and delivering the pointer with elegant precision.

Alvin Deutsch was a man of integrity who lived a life of kindness and thoughtfulness towards others. He was focused, incisive, engaged, erudite, affable, humorous, principled, and loyal. He was a gentleman, made in an old-world mold that no longer exists; he was a "mensch." May Alvin Deutsch always be remembered at Shearith Israel for his dignified and quiet leadership, for his love of our minhag, and for his devoted and caring friendship.

Thank you to Rabbi Marc Angel, Henry Lipschutz, Avery Neumark, Connie Shapiro and Gilles Sion for submitting memories of Alvin for this memorial. We extend sincere condolences to Alvin's wife, Davida Deutsch.

While The Guide to the Duties of the Heart (completed around 1075 CE) is sometimes called the first work of Jewish ethics, it aims to guide us towards a spiritual dedication, taught within a philosophical outlook that has similarities with both Saadiah Gaon and Maimonides. Besides philosophical concepts, Bahya ibn Paquda frequently uses stories and concepts from Sufism (Islamic mysticism) to stir in us a spiritual mindfulness and to deepen our love of God.

Rabbi Sjimon den Hollander was born in the Netherlands. He received his Master's degree in Arabic and Islamology from the University of Leiden. After subsequently earning a Bachelor's degree in education, he taught Comparative Religion at Ichthus Teachers' College in Rotterdam. More recently, Rabbi den Hollander received semikha from Rabbi Eliyahu Ben Haim and from Yeshiva University. He teaches Jewish literature at Hunter College. In addition, he does research on Islam's perception of Judaism and writes online articles in Arabic explaining Iudaism to a Muslim audience.

She adds to it with this recipe, saying, "I recently received the gift of *Sababa*, a wonderful cookbook with Middle Eastern recipes. One of them has become a favorite and pairs perfectly with the Jibbn. It is a grain salad made with freekeh, which I had difficulty locating locally, so I substituted bulgur wheat. The grain with roasted red grapes and toasted walnuts make me swoon."



FREEKEH AND ROASTED GRAPE SALAD

Ingredients:

1.5 cups freekeh or bulgur wheat, preferably whole

2.5 cups (1 pound) seedless red grapes

½ cup extra-virgin olive oil

1.5 tsp kosher salt

½ tsp freshly ground black pepper

½ cup plus 2 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice

1/4 tsp dried hot pepper flakes (Aura adds some cayenne)

Finely grated lemon rind of one lemon

½ cup finely chopped parsley

½ cup finely chopped red onion

½ cup chopped toasted walnuts

Optional: 4 oz of crumbled feta cheese

Instructions:

Prepare the freekeh or bulgur as directed on box

Place grapes on a large rimmed baking sheet, drizzle with 2 tablespoons of olive oil and $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp of the salt & $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp of the pepper

Roast in the oven, shaking the pan every 5 minutes or so, until the grapes shrivel and some are very caramelized and burned on the edges (20-30 minutes)

In a medium bowl, whisk 1/3 cup lemon juice with the remaining salt and pepper and the dried pepper flakes

Mix together the freekeh/bulgur, grapes, zest, parsley and onion

Just prior to serving, mix in more lemon juice, salt and pepper to taste, and toasted walnuts. Add feta if desired.

The Fast of Esther commemorates the day when the Jews of Persia donned sackcloth and ashes, went without food, and prayed that they be spared the massacre planned for them by Haman. Men don tefillin at the 6:30 pm service on Wednesday Evening.

Purim commemorates the day when, through the intervention of Mordecai and Queen Esther, the Jews of Persia narrowly escaped being victims of Haman's evil plot to exterminate them. Instead, "The Jews had light and gladness, joy and honor."

Purim Shushan, the day following Purim, was the actual day of celebration observed in Shushan, the capital of ancient Persia, and is the day Purim is observed in Jerusalem.


