FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

A remarkable self-portrait by Rembrandt, created late in life, bears a name that highlights apparent oddities about it: *Self*

Portrait with Two Circles. Two aspects of this work strike me as somewhat strange. The first is that Rembrandt has left his own hand unfinished. The second is the addition to the canvas of two circles that seem to have nothing to

do with the image itself. But, as I recently discussed in a synagogue lecture series, these two oddities are actually connected. Rembrandt deliberately highlights his own imperfections by leaving out his own artistic hand, and yet, as Simon Schama argues, lest anyone assume that he had lost his ability to paint and draw, Rembrandt goes out of his way to highlight how he can still create a perfect circle. When we combine these two themes, we realize that Rembrandt is seeking to highlight both his gifts and his own imperfection, reminding us that imperfection is not a source of defeatism, but rather a source of inspiration for improvement and invention.

It occurs to me that this painting perfectly captures the task that faces us in the Days of Awe ahead. In a wonderful essay, the writer Sarah Ridner connects unfinished paintings like Rembrandt's to the Talmudic tradition of leaving a bit of one's home unpainted, unfinished, in remembrance of the Temple's destruction. "Counterintuitively," Ridner writes, "reminding ourselves of our incompleteness specifically points to the promise of an eventual restoration." Similarly, confronting our own imperfections in the process of repentance is not meant to be a source of despair; rather, we are meant to join our confessions with a reflection on our God-granted gifts, and the opportunities given to us in our lives for growth. We are the artists of our lives; and with God's help, we seek to create, in both imperfection and beauty, the work of art that is the year ahead.

May it be a year of spiritual beauty for us all.

AVOIDING THE MAGINOT LINE FALLACY

We are headed into our 2022 High Holiday season. 5783. It is a beautiful time of year for our Congregation. Our Rosh Hashana and Kippur liturgy uplifts many of us for much of the year. We will celebrate our *Hatanim* this year in person, hopefully with more fanfare than last year's circumstances permitted. All three sets of our gorgeous Myer Myers *rimonim*, or Torah finials — currently on loan to the New-York Historical Society and the Boston Museum of Fine Arts, and at our Touro Synagogue in Newport, Rhode Island — will be with us from Succot through Shabbat Bereshit. Our choir is back.

Yet Covid-19 remains with us. At the time of this writing, the BA.5 Omicron variant continues to plague us. It is being referred to as the Reinfection Wave. Positivity rates and rates of spread are both escalating. So where are we going, and how are we going to proceed?

Simply put, we intend to continue to avoid as many blunders as we can. The Maginot Line in France was named for French Minister of War, André Maginot. The Maginot Line was comprised of a string of fortified buildings, other obstacles, and weapons built in the 1920/30s along a long stretch of the French-German (and related) borders. The thinking was that obstacles like that deterred the German war effort in WWI, so it would be sufficient in a subsequent war, too. The problem with the undertaking is that just about everything used to fight and mount an invasion was different in WWII than it was in WWI. Tanks could now go around or literally over the fortifications. Reconnaissance was more sophisticated, so German troops went north and invaded France in 1940 from the north, for example from the neutral Low Countries (such as Belgium), avoiding the vaunted Maginot Line.

It is important to avoid the blunder of thinking that the next Covid-19 challenge will resemble the prior one. It is just as important to avoid the blunder of thinking that we as a community are totally out of the woods.

With so many of us vaccinated/boosted, we do not face the same perils as we did in 2020 and even, for many of us, in 2021. But we still face risks. And we are trying not to repeat the Maginot Line Fallacy. We have been returning to a normalcy, but with protections:

- We will welcome those congregants who want to unmask and sit close by others. But we will continue to reserve space in our capacious sanctuary for those who prefer to remain masked, sit next to others who are masked, and observe what has become normal social distancing. We will respect the choices others make, even if that means they are sitting in our seat!
- We are also avoiding lurching back to a fully in-person learning environment.
 We continue to get the benefits of our Clergy's remote learning and lectures, essentially getting the best of both the inperson and virtual worlds.
- Finally, we are continuing to upkeep and use our Paved Paradise, the grassy lot adjacent to the Synagogue building where we congregate for an increasing number of events. It's lovely out there, and we

are making the most of the blessings it confers on us. We continue to have Kiddush on Paved Paradise, and we will enjoy our *Hatanim* luncheon out there as well.

I'm tempted to say that the only thing we are missing is you! But even there, many of you/ us have returned to a semblance of normalcy in attendance. For much of the summer, we have greeted 60-80 congregants weekly for Shabbat services. For us, for that time of year, that's a nice crowd. We have made minyan most days — again for us that's about where we were pre-Covid-19.

If we collectively err in not updating what is "normal" to meet new challenges, we also sometimes fail to see the beauty, the benefits, the bounty of actually repeating the past. This High Holiday season will be the 369th time that our Congregation will be celebrating together. That's a breath-taking statistic. It works best when we are together. Safe, careful, to be sure. But together.

Please join us this holiday season. And may we as individuals and as a community merit the miracles occurring every day around us.

REFLECTING ON REFLECTING: a High Holiday Reflection

The Jewish new year is a time for reflection. We often think of personal reflection as a time to consider where we may have fallen short, to some extent on our personal goals, but more so, in our responsibilities and commitments to others, and to God. It's a time of literal self-recriminatory breast-



beating (אשמנו, בגדנו, פשענו). But reflection is not only about seeing the flaws and facing our shortcomings. Reflections, like in a mirror or in the water, also consist of shimmering light and split seconds of unusual beauty.

Our High Holiday season involves both: we reflect on the past year, confessing our sins and missteps, and we commit to do better with a sense of optimism and faith that we will do better and the new year will be better. This unique and nuanced form of optimism is so Jewish.

We all know the old adage about the "lull before the storm" but there's also the saying that "the sun shines brightest after the storm." In the worst of times we Jews adapt, laugh, endure. Covid has been a difficult time for all of us and a terrible time for some. But no one would reasonably argue that it's the worst our people have endured (even if it's the worst some of us have endured in our own lifetimes).

I've always been astounded that my own parents, Holocaust survivors who were part of a community of Polish Jewish "wanderers" in Soviet territory including Siberia and various "Stans," actually fell in love and got married in Kazakhstan

while the war was still on, and had two babies soon after the war (including my sister who was born in a DP camp in Bavaria). What optimism! And by the way, their "war" did not end when the war was over.

Their journey to freedom took years and included: post-war pogroms and antisemitism, refugee life in DP camps, semi-legal emigration to North America, and finally, the long bumpy road of adjusting to their new life in America. I remember how they used to cry at *Yizkor* (the Ashkenazi memorial prayer) and wailed on Kippur. But most of the time, they were optimistic, forward thinking, and grateful for life.

The sun shines brightest after the storm. Let us pray during this holiday season that the storm is behind us, and the sun will shine on us bringing each of us, and our entire community, the many blessings we deserve or will commit to deserving.



In 2019, in celebration of our 365th Year of Years Celebration, we brought all three sets back for ritual use together as well as in exhibition at a special capstone event.

RETROSPECTIVE:

TOURO SHABBATON 2022

It was a pleasure getting reacquainted with the folks we had met at the shabbaton in Newport in November, 2019. We are grateful to Parnas Louis Solomon and Beth Goldman who opened their home and to all at Congregation Shearith Israel who opened their synagogue and their hearts. Among those I would like to mention are Rabbis Soloveichik and Rhode, Rev. Zachary Edinger, and Executive Director, Barbara Reiss.

The hospitality and warmth made us feel comfortable and welcome in keeping with the generosity of allowing us to become Affiliates of the oldest congregation in America. When Congregation Jeshuat Israel member Aaron Ginsburg suggested a Covid-friendly table at Friday night dinner his idea was promptly and cheerfully accepted.

I was honored to be called up to the *tebah* for an aliyah in the magnificent surroundings of Shearith Israel and enjoyed the Sephardic services. During the tour of Shearith Israel with Zachary, we learned that the design included two rooms modeled on the previous Shearith Israel buildings. The nod to history struck a chord to Newporters.

In the ancient CSI cemetery, I was interested to see the *matzevah* of Abraham Rodriquez Rivera, a member of The Newport Artillery Company. The Company, founded in 1741 and still in existence, is located at 23 Clarke Street in Newport, just down the hill from Touro Synagogue. Rivera gave a Hebrew Tanach to Newport's Redwood Library. The library was designed by the same architect who designed Touro Synagogue, Peter Harrison. Rabbi Theodore Lewis happened upon the gift when the librarian, Mr. Gibbs, asked about the meaning of a psalm. Rabbi Lewis asked for a Hebrew bible, and that was the only one the library had.

After visiting the cemetery, we walked around lower Manhattan and experienced the Kehila Kedosha Janina Synagogue's Greek Jewish festival. This festival reflects the diversity of New York City's Jewish community. Although many Sephardic Jews settled in Greece, the KKJ community is Romaniote and may date to the Roman Empire. By comparison, CSI and CJI are new kids on the block!

I look forward to future opportunities to cultivate our friendly relationship, in both New York and Newport, and to working together to preserve our mutual history.

While *The Guide to the Duties of the Heart* (completed around 1075 CE) is sometimes called the first work of Jewish ethics, it aims to guide us towards a spiritual dedication, taught within a philosophical outlook that has similarities with both Saadiah Gaon and Maimonides. Besides philosophical concepts, Bahya ibn Paquda frequently uses stories and concepts from Sufism (Islamic mysticism) to stir in us a spiritual mindfulness and to deepen our love of God.

Rabbi Sjimon den Hollander was born in the Netherlands. He received his Master's degree in Arabic and Islamology from the University of Leiden. After subsequently earning a Bachelor's degree in education, he taught Comparative Religion at Ichthus Teachers' College in Rotterdam. More recently, Rabbi den Hollander received semikha from Rabbi Eliyahu Ben Haim and from Yeshiva University. He teaches Jewish literature at Hunter College. In addition, he does research on Islam's perception of Judaism and writes online articles in Arabic explaining Judaism to a Muslim audience.

After nine years of planning by a dedicated committee consisting of Shearith Israel staffers and congregants, members of the West 11th Street Block Association, and talented retained conservation experts, work is finally underway. The plan to restore the wall (and more) of Shearith Israel's historic West 11th Street Cemetery, the second oldest cemetery in NY which dates back to 1805, was enthusiastically approved and permitted by NYC's Landmarks Preservation Commission, and construction has begun. The anticipated completion date is November, 2022.

RESTORATION of the WEST 11th STREET CEMETERY IS UNDERWAY

We are in the midst of rebuilding the street-facing wall and repairing the interior walls. Our contractor, West New York Restoration, has dismantled the decrepit wall and is salvaging and storing the historic bricks for reuse as part of the new wall. Jablonski Building Conservation has carefully removed fragile grave markers and stored them until they can be properly restored. Our arborist, Bill Logan, has been advising on how to protect and preserve a rare but thriving American Elm. "What's Happening Here/How You Can Help" signage has been affixed along the fence so passers-by can learn about this gem of New York City history and the restoration project (and how to contribute).

We are delighted by our deep and fruitful collaboration with the West 11th Block Association. As Marion Howard, President, W11BA, wrote, "It is not often that residents on a block have such a concrete opportunity for giving and creating a legacy in their neighborhood."

Now we turn to you, our members and friends who best understand the importance of Shearith Israel's role and responsibility in preserving American Jewish history, including the oldest Jewish cemeteries in NY.

When *Caring Connection* lacks the expertise or resources to provide appropriate assistance, they do their best to direct people to other congregational and communal organizations.




MEALS FOR MOURNERS AND NEW PARENTS
