Members of God's Royal Family: An Intimate and Elevated Connection

The Name Changes of Abram to Abraham and Sarai to Sarah, the accompanying Covenant of Circumcision, and the subsequent promise of a child to Sarah have often baffled me. Or perhaps I should explain: Within the Parashah of Lekh-Lekha, there seem to be several promises of both Land in Canaan as well as progeny which would multiply into a great populace or nation, in 12:1-3, then again in 13:14-17, also in 15:1-8, summarized in 15:18. The promise in Chapter 17 is longer and grander, but why is it necessary? What makes it different, and how does it change things? After all, by Chapter 15 already, the promise to Abram has already been elevated to the level of a "Covenant," (Heb. "ברית"), a special "deal" or agreement, and this deal has already been symbolically been "cut" and sealed by the offering of animals, cutting them in half, and by God, symbolized by a flame of fire and furnace of smoke, passing between the pieces along with Abram. But if this agreement has already been sealed by this earlier "covenant" ceremony, what is the point of the Name Change and Circumcision Covenant?

The best answer I come up with is two-pronged: The name-change and circumcision covenant bespeak a connection between Abram and God which is at the same time more intimate as well as even more noble. Circumcision obviously denotes the highest level of trust and intimacy. A man only lets another man he trusts and loves touch him at his most vulnerable spot. Our word "testicle" is related to "testimony" and the connection derives from a Classical usage of a man's holding the testicles of his fellow when swearing. Doing so was an ancient sign of trust, truthfulness, fealty, and loyalty. We see a trace of this usage a little further on in the swearing of Eliezer to Abraham. In agreeing to a covenant cut and stamped upon man's most vulnerable member, Abraham and his descendants symbolize their ultimate trust in God, and a deep level of loyalty and fealty. At the same time, there is this elevating and ennobling aspect. I could speculate that perhaps circumcision itself was anciently performed mostly for the nobility and higher classes, and that by requiring circumcision for Abraham's entire household, God is elevating the entire household to nobility.

In addition, though, the name change also elevates and ennobles, in this case beyond nobility, to the level of royalty. My interpretation is that it is as if Abram is now being adopted as Honorary Member of God's Royal Family, so to speak. Being adopted as a Member of a Royal Family asserts a more intimate connection to the Monarch as well as signifying a further ennobling elevation. And a Proper Prince must have a legitimate Heir through a Proper Princess. Perhaps Abram had already been knighted as a noble or human king through the previous Covenant Between the Pieces, but with the status of God's Royal Family, Abraham's heir must come from a recognized Princess, not through a maidservant, to guarantee universal recognition of the Royal Heir. Part of the essence of true royalty is its dynastic aspirations; royalty aims to stabilize a polity by keeping political leadership within a family. Continuity in leading and weathering the storms of leadership can then be taught and inculcated by breeding, training, and careful preparation. The etiquette for an ideal Royal Family shows a mixture of distancing elevation and ennobling as well as intimacy. Often this combination leads to intimate sacrificial pain, which must be borne nobly, as when Abraham must accede to the exile of Ishmael, who is not a fit heir for a Royal.

But the connection which Abraham's descendant, the Nation of Israel, will ultimately have with God will remain this most intimate and elevating. Israel is encumbered with many Royal Duties and obligations, and Israel's intimacy with their Monarch will cause pain which will strike in the most vulnerable areas. God is Israel's Father; God's Name is called upon Israel. God at times lavishes special Favor upon His People Israel, and Israel can then beg specially for that Favor through this intimate Family connection to God Himself.
