## Building the Ideal Structure, the Home: Setting Out Upon the Golden Path

What do the laws of structuring the Tabernacle according to God's precise plans have to do with the moral and civil law codes which precede it, other than that both were shown to Moses at Sinai? And why should they have been given consecutively at Sinai in the first place? Borrowing a page out of our Parnas Lou Solomon's weekly remarks, I found the answer in the classic movie song "Follow the Yellow Brick Road" and the story line from the classic movie "The Wizard of Oz." Much of our more-recent popular culture rejects and pillories (as Elton John does) the concept of a "proper path" to follow in life, a golden well-trodden and well-paved path referred to in Hebrew as the "שביל הזהב" which will lead us surely and certainly to our life's aims and goals at the end of the rainbow with the security of and safety of being "at home" in the world. But the original story of the Wizard of Oz does indeed allude to such a golden yellow well-paved path which will lead us surely and safely to our life's goals and back home again in certainty and safety, provided that we do not veer from it nor be perturbed by adversity and fear from persevering upon it.

What does this have to do with the building and architecture of the Tabernacle? Well, as I have commented in the past, the building of an ideal home for God comes to teach us how to structure the ideal home and life for ourselves and our own families. The building of its structure must be architecturally well-planned so that it can withstand the ravages of the elements. It should be constructed of the best materials and arranged with an aesthetic eye for balance, symmetry and beauty. Its service should follow a fixed schedule, so that lights are kindled on-time and meals served regularly. The Tabernacle is all about giving an ideal structure to life, and about the most fundamental ideal structure of all which one should establish: to build a home. Building a home might seem trite and mundane, but it really should be thought of as something sublime and ideal, the Torah says. Architecturally structure our life properly, according to the ideal forms shown to Moses upon Mt. Sinai, and we will reach our goals and make it back "home" again in safety and security. We must not be enticed or drawn off the path nor be perturbed by disturbances in our way: Rather, just follow the golden path laid out for us in the Torah and all will be well. The Children of Israel had much to perturb them in the Desert, but as long as the pursued the well-laid path lit by the Pillar of Fire in Moses' Law they had nothing to fear.

There is much to divert us from following the Yellow Brick Road and giving a formal and sound structure to our lives. We may be led astray by attractions elsewhere. We may not trust the path forward; we may nostalgically look to turn back to Egypt. Fears of lack of water and food, as well as fear of adversaries ahead may grind our progress to a halt. Of late the celebrity Canadian psychologist Dr. Jordan Peterson has been speaking of the dissuading especially of modern-day young men but also of women in today's culture from pursuing long-term relationships, entering marriage, and establishing a home in which to raise children. Up until recently, I never fully understood the story of The Wizard of Oz as the parable it is of the qualms we all have about our own unfitness to embark upon this path to what should be our goals at the end of the rainbow. The Cowardly Lion protests that he is too fearful to embark on the journey and lacks courage. The Tin Woodsman lacks drive and ambition, claiming that he doesn't have the heart to pursue a goal or a love. The Scarecrow protests that his knowledge is still insufficient or uncertain and he doesn't know enough to succeed, that he lacks the brains. But ultimately all we must do is to plod ahead upon the well-laid structures of the Yellow Brick Road, not being perturbed by what we think we lack in fitness and not being lured astray from the golden path paved for us. And as we trod that road we will find that we had had all along the courage, the drive and capacity to love, as well as the wits and brains to make it. As long as we are open to playing our part in helping Dorothy and our society, we can and will succeed, by just sticking to that Golden Path. The laws of the Ten Commandments and the statutes which follow are themselves scary and may seem impossible to completely fulfill. They set the ethical bar extremely high for us: Where will we get the money, we wonder, to always pay our workers on-time? But if a man structures his life with the goal of making an Ideal Home, following in that Golden Brick Path laid out by God and his people, he will discover that all along he had the knowhow, the courage, and the drive to make his way and build himself a home in the Promised Land.
