Spring Thoughts: Time's Passage Regenerates, Purifies, and Heals

What connections are there between the first chapter of Parashat Tazria, about the impurity and purification of the birthing mother, and the following sections, about "("tzara`at"), the famous "scale disease" (often misleadingly translated as "leprosy") which follow? Well, one thing both sections have in common is the precise counting of a standard period of days before purification. The Torah seems to leave the counting of days for a birthing mother to the woman and presumably to her family themselves.

For "tsara'at," the period of time is marked by the Priest. Although scale-disease may be suspected, it is left to the Priest to make a determination whether the lesion is deep enough and shows symptoms to be classified as "scale-disease" at an initial consultation. If not, it is simply classified as an ordinary wound. If the symptoms are present and the lesion is deeper than surface-level, then that depth and also the area extent of the lesion are noted. Following this a period of quarantine is counted, the seven-day period of a week, at the conclusion of which there is a second consultation with the Priest. If at this second consultation the lesion is seen to have spread to a more extensive surface area (the text uses the rare verb פשה ("pasa") meaning "to spread"), the case is confirmed definitively as "scale disease" and definitively declared diseased/contaminated and "impure," with quarantine and expulsion from the community until further notice. It was recognized, however, that the passage of time would be a deciding factor in making this assessment; one visit would not be enough to judge. Time is a crucial factor in healing, and time can make all the difference between an entrenched case and a minor injury.

Many purificatory rites mentioned here involve the counting of passages of time. This "counting days for purification" theme further connects these Parashiyot to the spring season in which we read these Parashiyot, a connection I noted in last year's Debar Torah. Spring signifies Time's capacity to heal and bring rebirth after Autumn's death and Winter's latency. This year, these Parashiyot are read in the midst of the Counting of the Days of the Omer, which is also considered a purificatory period. This year we read this section on Shabbat Rosh Hodesh Iyar, and a month is also a cycle of growth, death and rebirth. The Spring Season signifies the capacity of Time to bring about regeneration, rebirth, and healing. And the Spring always recurs cyclically, after precise passages of time and days we can count. The days of the year almost equal the precise number of degrees in a circle, which bring us back to the same point from which we started. To number our days is to know the secrets of knowing how to heal, regenerate, and purify. The passage of time regrows, restores potency and strength, and thereby heals.
