By the Word Did Ancient Babylon Rise and Fall

One of our Bible's main foci of interest is Mesopotamia, and especially Lower Mesopotamia in the region of Babylon. Nimrod is named, along with the names of other cities in the area, as well as upper Mesopotamia, in a genealogy of their eponymous founders in Gen. 10:8-12. Curiously, Egypt and its adjacent Kush (Nubia/Ethiopia) is also listed alongside. Babylon is also the focus of the famous story of the Tower of Babel, which follows in Chapter 11. Babylon and Mesopotamia loom large in the Bible also as the worldly powers which conquer Israel and Judea, destroy the Temple, and take Israelites and Judeans back to live there as a captive people. Egypt/Kush is like Babylon in having a great civilization based in a well-irrigated large river valley in which structures are built using man-made brick, so perhaps that explains the association. Accounted for between the rivers of Mesopotamia and Kush are three of the four fabled rivers of the Garden of Eden.

The Tower of Babel story clearly is meant to assail the advanced civilizations of large urbanized societies/empires centered in the great river valleys. Although these cities lie in lowland valleys, they aim to build themselves up artificially high to the sky! Further, although they have plentiful and fertile soil, clay, and mud in their valleys, they lack exposed rock, which leads them to fashion durable buildings out of fired clay baked into longer-lasting brick. The worry of these ancient "Babylonians" which leads them to build their tower seems to be "lest they spread out upon the face of all the land;" the continued advance of their civilization to prominence seems to require the concentration of population which urbanization makes possible. For this purpose, they seem to have built upwards, it seems. Also striking is the story's premise that the civilization was united by one language and that God stops them from succeeding in their project by dividing mankind by language. We are told it is this Divine linguistic division that leads to God's physical separation and scattering of post-Noahide Mankind across the face of the earth, spreading them out and hence ending the intense upward-building urbanization project and the need which was its impetus.

It is true that ancient Sumerian and Akkadian and later Babylonian civilizations reached astounding heights, and they built great urban concentrations of populations. They also had managed a good deal of at least written linguistic uniformity. Written Sumerian and Akkadian circulated widely for quite some time in the ancient world, and the end of their use was associated with a steep decline in the level of civilization. The Babylon in which Jerusalem's Exiles lived was respected as the heir to a great ancient and powerful civilization. And yet it had been succeeded by Assyrians and their languages and Babylon struggled to reestablish itself. The ancient Babylonian science, technology and language fell into eclipse became forgotten until rediscovered in modern times.

It's hard to discern the lessons intended in this for the Children of Israel. The energies necessary to concentrate and build up great and impressive civilizations generate powerful centrifugal forces which can easily spin out of control and rip them apart. The bigger they are, the harder they fall. Israel must take account of the great powers, but not lose hope, for sudden disunity can disarray the most advanced and established of powers, and this can bring advantage. Great power is often fostered by manufacture and artifice and makes use of unnatural means, which leave it ultimately less stable and liable to upset, cracking and breakage. Perhaps the most enigmatic message in the tale is the role of language in fostering unity as well as in tearing a civilization apart. We know that keeping the Jewish Scriptural traditions fostered Jewish unity during the Babylonian Exile. Similar language, perhaps including similar rhetoric, are seen as key to unity.

Babylon was admired for its power, a power much facilitated by written languages, tablets of which remain today as testament. But centrifugal forces altering the languages and dispersing the population eventually could not be resisted. It was by Language and unified Word that ancient Babylon arose, and it is by God's Confounding Word that Babylon falls.
