The Lessons of Lot's Complacency Versus Abram's Engagement

The affairs of Abram's nephew Lot and the consequences in which they entangle Abram take up a good deal of our Parasha. Lot makes some fateful choices which, while not evil in themselves, expose Lot and his family to evil. While under Abram's wing, Lot prospers. But when Lot leaves Abram's sphere of protection, it proves disastrous and requires Abram's stepping up to his rescue.

Lot has come from Haran with Abram, and he presumably gained wealth in livestock along with Abram. Abram and Lot had some wealth, but we are told that Abram gained wealth in particular from the incident with Sarai and Pharaoh; presumably Lot also gained from that incident. But Lot's share of wealth leads to a split. The Torah describes the split as emanating from a dispute among Lot's and Abram's shepherds, not from Lot himself. But Lot fails to take charge of the dispute to resolve it or concede the dispute to Abram, leading Abram himself to suggest a territorial split. Lot chooses what seems to be a choice and very attractive piece of territory, a well-watered irrigated valley, but that most-attractive choice proves disastrous. Lot's neighbors in that region, we are told, were evil and sinful, and the Torah indicates that this evil is responsible for bringing destruction upon them, an evil in which Lot gets caught up, although he and his family survive. The "War of the Four Kings Against the Five" is the first wave of that destruction, which Lot and his neighbors survive only through Abram's coming to their rescue. Abram and Abram's God are recognized and rewarded, but Lot's neighbors don't truly repent of their ways. In the next parasha we are told of an even more devastating calamity which befalls Lot's land and all his neighbors, which he barely escapes.

Lot's family go on to form Israel's closest neighboring peoples, and they do go on later to prosper. But the implication here is that Lot and his family, due to their lack of leadership, their choice of the seemingly "easy" way, and their failure to protest evil, were likely to get caught up in calamity. Their failure to fully rally to Abram's side, the side of Good and Righteousness, is also notable. And also notable is Lot's utter dependence upon Abram for his rescue. Abram feels obliged to rescue his kinsman Lot and goes to great lengths to do so. Indeed, Abram goes to great length to respect, honor, and justify all those innocents who are not utterly complicit with evil. But nonetheless, Lot's taking what seemed like the "easiest" path and failure to exert leadership are apparent. Although Lot had come all the way from Haran with Abram, he settled for a life of complacency, a complacency which he thought would bring him tranquility and ease, but ultimately brought him weakness and calamity. Abram, on the other hand, chooses the "higher ground," rather than the well-watered valley. He chooses a role of active engagement and concern. Although he heroically exposes himself to risk, he ends up all the stronger for it.
