Jacob Becomes Strong Only By Pairing With God's Sovereignty

There are a lot of, should we call them, "double entendres" or double- or triple- or quadruple- meanings in the Bible and its stories. The place-name "Mahanaim" we encountered at the end of last-week's Parasha continues to be explicated at the beginning of this week's. Mahanaim is understood as meaning "double-encampments." The city or twin-city or area known as Mahanaim seems to have been a major capital or holy city in the northern trans-Jordanian region. That general region was referred to as Gilead, a name which seems to be explained as "mound of witness," referring to the mound upon which Laban and Jacob made their peace-treaty, near some Jabbok River fords. The dispute and peace-treaty there between Laban and Jacob may have been seen as symbolic of later wars with Syria in which Syria claimed and took the Gilead region. Mahanim seems to be explicated first as an encampment of Divine Angels opposite Jacob's camp. Perhaps the "two camps" were also symbolic of the peace-treaty of Laban's Syrian camp opposite Jacob's Israelite camp. Then Jacob sends messengers to Esau telling his brother that he was returning from Aram southward, in Esau's direction. When Jacob is told that Esau has marched towards him accompanied by 400 men, Jacob strategically then divides his own entourage into two camps for protection, so that if one camp was attacked the other would survive. Hence this division of his own camp in two also seems to be explaining the "Mahanaim" name, as the place where Jacob split his camp. Then, in Jacob's statement to Esau in 32:10, Jacob gratefully acknowledges that although he had fled Canaan and crossed the Jordan with no entourage whatsoever, he has now returned with two-camps-worth of an entourage, i.e., he has received a "double-portion of blessing." This too also seems to be explicating "Mahanaim." In Verse 21, we are told that Jacob's tributary gift "crossed over" before him, but that he stayed in the "camp." In 22, Jacob and his family ford the Jabbok, although we are told in Verse 23 that Jacob again brings his family and possessions across the Jabbok. Considering that Jacob has been by these fords of the Jabbok since he met Laban, how many times does he cross? Perhaps he has to cross several times to get them all across; that is what Rashi and the Midrash assume. But then, despite having seemingly crossed with his family and possessions, how is it that we are told that Jacob is left alone afterwards for the night to wrestle with the angel? And then we are given a new place-name for that place: Penuel or Peniel," where Jacob, now renamed Israel, met God "face-to-face." You need two to meet "face-to-face;" that too indicates a pair. Penuel became in later Israelite history a capital and possibly a holy site. Since Penuel could not be far from Mahanaim, archaeologists have speculated that Mahanaim and Penuel were twin-cities on strategic mounds on opposite sides of sharp bends of the Jabbok, and that too might explain Mahanaim as "paired encampments." Perhaps the sharp bends of the river might explain the fording back and forth.

The name Israel also seems to have double entendres, if not more than double: Our text seems to explain it as "he wrestled with God." But it can also mean "God rules." Indeed, while the verse says that Jacob wrestled with God and won, Jacob sustains lasting injury and it seems in many respects that the angel, representing God, has actually won. The match is perhaps closer to a draw. Jacob has stood his ground, but at great cost. Later in 33:20 another origin of the name Israel is given, as the site of the altar in Shekhem is called "God, God of Israel." Indeed, the entire religion of "Israel" expresses that it is only God who is the true Ruler, the True Sovereign.

Such is the ambiguity and many meanings of Israel's existence: Israel indeed is strong, but his strength derives though his acceptance that only God truly rules, that only God is truly Sovereign. Jacob must prepare himself for conflict practically, dividing his camp in two, but also know that if the strategy works it is only because it was Divinely granted and inspired, through the double-portion of blessing granted to him by God and through the double fortification of not one but two camps of angels. Jacob knows that he lives only through constantly facing God's Presence, which can also be called "Peniel." Jacob indeed has descendants who indeed later divide into two camps, Israel and Judah. But ultimately Jacob/Israel, born as a twin, succeeds only through pairing whatever strength he has, often at great cost and sacrifice, with the Rule of God.
