The Pillar of God, Protection from Our Shifting Fears

In 13:21 we are told that a Pillar of Cloud went before the Israelites to lead them by day, as well as a Pillar of Fire at night. The Pillar somehow embodied God's Presence. Since God is One, I always pictured only one Pillar, a Pillar of Fire at night which tuned into a Pillar of Cloud in the daytime. But we are not told about such a pillar metamorphosis. So perhaps there were indeed two distinctly different Pillars! Further, if the function was to lead the people on their way in the desert, why there was need for a Pillar of Cloud at all? Couldn't a Pillar of Fire have shown the People the path daytime and nighttime? One could answer that in the bright desert sun a fire would not have been that distinctive, but I would have thought that even during the day a Pillar of Fire would have been visible enough! However, other considerations must have been at play! Even Divine Fires would have been hot, and you wouldn't want to follow it during daytime desert heat! And a bright beacon during the daytime would have been followed not only by Israelites, but by their enemies, as well. Whereas desert night is known to be especially dark, and, hence few enemies were likely to venture out anyway. Moreover, a bright beacon in just one spot would not have been enough to take away the overall cover of darkness of the desert night. On the other hand, during the daytime, a Cloud Pillar would have been able to lead and yet keep the Israelites under cover. Further, a Cloud Pillar, even if it was way out in front of them, would offer at least some relief, cover, and protection from the scorching desert heat. And it is indeed unclear whether these "pillars" were indeed solely out in front or whether they hovered over the Israelites somewhat to provide the Israelites with shelter from heat and light so they could see in general, not just directing them. The Israelites needed shelter and light all about them, not just in front! So already in 13:21, the function was more than just to lead Israel on their way day and night: They served a protective function, as well.

Hence it becomes less surprising when the Pillar or Pillars switch position in 14:19 and stand at the backside of the Israelites, between the Israelites and the Egyptians, as the Israelites are ordered to cross into the split Sea. Of course, that section is difficult to interpret: The verse speaks of there being "the cloud and the darkness, and it illumined the night." We hadn't heard the term "darkness" before: was that yet another manifestation of the "Pillar," or was the darkness a manifestation of a dense fog in the middle of the Pillar of Cloud? Was the illumination from the Pillar of Fire? But Fire in back would have brought illumination not only to Israel but to the enemy, as well! That's why Hizkuni suggests that the Pillar of Fire stayed in front of Israel and that it was only the Pillar of Cloud which switched positions, an interpretation which is in line with our supposition that there were two Pillars. Another possibility: Perhaps the term does not mean to "illumine" at all, but might mean to provide cover, or alternatively to cause a further curse of darkness to fall upon the night. I can imagine it might mean to illumine with lightning bolts and storm, also implying that this was thick stormy Darkness from the Pillar of Cloud, not Fire. Also, if there was no Fire Pillar leading in front, how did the Israelites find their way? (Although you can answer that it was probably obvious to find their way through the part of the waves to the other side!) One could also answer that a beacon from behind them projected light to the front, illuminating their steps from slipping in the mud, but that this light was concealed from the Egyptians by the thick Darkness of the Cloud.

All these conjectures show that the Pillar served as a multi-purpose and multi-faceted protection from that which Israel feared, and that applies to us as well: At times, that which we fear is the unknown we cannot see ahead of us. At other times, we fear the destruction coming from the scorching sun or the rain, and need cover and shelter from above. And then there are times when we fear not so much plowing ahead but must be on guard and be protected from the enemy which stalks behind. From all these we must stand firm and not fear, but rather rely upon God, our One Pillar of Strength.
