The Inspiring End Which Made the Project Possible From the Beginning

Parashat Pekude presents a summarizing of the entire building of the Tabernacle, along with a final summarizing narrative at the end describing how the Tabernacle was anointed and inaugurated and put into use, ending Exodus with the Descent of the Cloud/Fire Pillar of God upon the Tabernacle. Ostensibly the purpose of the summary is to give a full summary "accounting" of everything which went into building the Tabernacle, and indeed the name and first words of the Parasha mean "these are the accounting." The Parasha does start out with accounting figures and inventories of the wood and textiles used. But the Book doesn't end there with the accounting and inventory: It goes on to describe the anointing and inauguration of all the different parts and doesn't stop its summarization until it tells us how the entire Tabernacle was fully assembled and put into use, with the Pillar of God descending upon it and ascending when it was time for Israel to decamp and move on. Why didn't Pekude just end with the accounting and inventory? And the summarizing narrative here is problematic: Our Parasha mentions the Inauguration of Aaron and His Sons as well as anointing and inauguration of everything else here. Yet Leviticus, which ostensibly follows, then goes back and retells the Inauguration of the Priests in more detail later. And indeed some of the details don't quite line up with the description in Leviticus: Our Parasha doesn't mention the incident with Nadab and Abihu at all, for example. There is no explanation here of how exactly the Priests were purified, or how the vessels were purified. We could assume that the processes described in Exodus are the same ones which Leviticus just spells out in more detail. Hence we could assume that much of this narrative didn't happen until later. However, why should Exodus have needed to summarize everything up to when the Tabernacle was complete and actually put into use?

One can answer that our Parasha's name "Pekude" does not only mean "accounting" but also "Recounting" and "Visitation." Thus part of the "accounting" must include a summarizing "recounting". Further, Parashat "Pekude" could not end until God's Pillar descended upon the Tabernacle because it was then that God came down to "Visit" the Children of Israel. But there is perhaps a deeper message here: The end for which the Tabernacle was planned and constructed was kept in mind from the beginning: As a student of Greek philosophy I sometimes like to point out that Aristotle considers the "telos" or end a kind of "cause," what is called the "final cause" or "teleological cause". The end or final purpose is often in-mind from the very inception, "causing" it to come into being, and such was very much the case here, in these matters of Holiness. Everything given for the Tabernacle had to have a special intent and a dedication which had to be guaranteed fulfillment. The holy end to which it was to be consecrated had to be born in mind at all times. Besides, in complex construction the work is nowhere near complete until all parts are assembled and the whole is found to be in working order. The purpose of serving God and having Him dwell in a Sanctuary among Israel was the end which excited a fervor in Israel and made the glorious project of building such a glorious Sanctuary possible, even for a people wandering in the desert. The whole amazingly glorious and complex enterprise was only possible through the inspiration of the aim of serving God. And it was the zeal for that same Sacred End which pushed the project through miraculously to completion, despite any obstacles, to the Very End.
