

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

In every generation and generation, one is obligated to see oneself as if one left Egypt.

So our Haggadah tells us. The sentence is famous, but with a seemingly redundant word. It would have seemed sufficient to say that one re-experiences the Exodus *bekhol dor*, in every generation; but the Hebrew is *bekhol dor vador*, in every generation "and generation." The Rabbis, I think, are keying us into the essence of intergenerational Jewish memory, which lies in linking *dor vador*, generation to generation. The essence of Jewish memory is seeing ourselves as taking part in a transmission, with every Jewish generation linked to the one before and the one after—and all intimately bound up with another.

It is striking, therefore, that this seemingly strange phrase appears once more in the Haggadah, referring this time not to our intergenerational memory but to our intergenerational assailants: "in every generation and generation they rise up against us to destroy us." This literary link is no coincidence. So many enemies have arisen, but all are gone, and the Jewish people, thanks to its link of generations, endures. We are exquisitely aware, this year, of the enemies that arise in every generation, including our own; but this awareness can also enhance our appreciation of the miracle of Jewish intergenerational eternity, inspiring us, this Pesah, to spiritually join ourselves to each other.

SHEARITH ISRAEL: A COMMUNITY STRONG KINGDOM

We all know well the division our Sages have employed, since ancient times, dividing good deeds, righteous acts, and ritual obligations into those between a human being and the Almighty (bayn adam l'Makom) and between one human being and another (bayn adam l'chavero). If we liken how we see the religious world to the taxonomic system in biology, then, of species, genus, family, order, class, phylum, kingdom, and domain, the two hierarchies laid out by our Sages would appear to be near the top. Let's say they are "kingdoms," just for ease of exposition.

I believe there is a third kingdom in our religion: community. There are deep and abiding emanations of this from our Sages and our more recent religious leaders. Recall how Rabbi Joseph B. Soloveichik, for example, explicated how communal prayer was in fact qualitatively different from individual prayer. Something categorically different happens when we practice our faith as part of a community.

The kingdom of community is different from the other two kingdoms in a fundamental way. One can alone pursue a righteous existence with the Almighty. One can alone pursue a righteous existence with other human beings. In those kingdoms, it takes only one to tango. When it comes to community, however, many more than that are needed to make the kingdom a living reality.

Shearith Israel is a community strong kingdom. Let's consider how we show it with a few examples:

First, our strength as a community shines through the lens of how we dealt with Covid-19. This was a dreadful disease for many of us and a confusing and isolating episode for all of us. As a community, even four years on, we still say a silent kaddish for those members who died during the pre-vaccine phase of the pandemic, when sadly we could not give them a proper funeral or burial. As painful as it is for

some of us to remember, our collective memory needs to remain a part of our history.

Second, there are some things we did well during Covid-19 to help congregants who would otherwise have felt isolated. We strengthened our community as a result. To this day, Rabbi Soloveichik, Rabbi Rohde, and Reverend Edinger hold dozens of Zoom programs monthly. Our Rabbinic Intern, Baruch-Lev Kelman, does as well. They strengthen our community as a result.

Third, our fellow-Jews in Israel have experienced horror and tragedy since October 7, 2023. As a community, we have sent funds. We collectively pray for the swift cessation of the war multiple times daily. We stand to honor our allegiance both to Israel and to America every Shabbat.

Fourth, the record turnouts for our community Shabbat dinners this year evidence our communal strength. The dinners have been marvelous. We have come together, and we have had many evenings together of conviviality and fun.

Finally, is there a better testament to our strength as a community than that, with a record number of families, we successfully raised the funds needed to ensure that our sacred space reflects the reverence it deserves by replacing our carpeting and fixing our worn

Sanctuary flooring? Do not underestimate how challenging this capital campaign was. There are so many other important calls on our charitable resources (not least of all, the vital needs of Israel). Yet our community as a community understood that each of us was essential to the success of the whole. We were community strong in our *Year of Hope Campaign*.

There are many rules to follow to be righteous vis-à-vis our Creator. There seem like an equally dizzying number needed to achieve righteousness vis-à-vis our fellow human beings. To keep our community strong kingdom growing and vibrant, however, is much simpler. It requires only that we **show up, join in, be a part**. Yes, that too presents challenges, especially in a world where we all have too much to do and too many pulls on our time and attention. But if we all continue to **show up, join in, be a part**, that will sustain us as a community strong kingdom.



LIFT UP YOUR HANDS AND BLESS THE LORD


As the oldest Jewish congregation in North America, Shearith Israel is blessed with many ritual objects of historical interest. We endeavor whenever possible to keep these sacred objects in ritual use. A few years ago, we discovered, hidden away among some broken pieces of silver an object of historical significance. Since its discovery, we have restored it and returned it to ritual use. This is its story.

In 2019, the auction house Sotheby's helped inventory our ritual silver. In the course of performing this inventory, we came across a broken piece of a twisted silver Torah pointer (*Yad*) and discovered that it bore the mark "MM." This mark belonged to Myer Myers, a highly

esteemed silversmith of the colonial era and a prominent member of our congregation. Myers, renowned for his exquisite domestic silver, is particularly celebrated for crafting five Torah finials (*rimonim*) and a circumcision shield for ritual use in early America. Despite being only a broken half of a *Yad*, the unearthing of this previously unknown object is noteworthy. Its discovery elicited great excitement among all present.

When I looked at this broken *Yad*, I realized that its design was similar to a *Yad* being used in the Little Synagogue. Upon examination, it became clear that the back part of the pointer we were using at daily services was a match for the broken piece we had just found.







The Yad being used in the Little Synagogue was once thought lost. It was dedicated by David & Tamar de Sola Pool in 1942 in honor of Henry & Rosalie Hendricks. Dr. Pool had apparently taken two broken pieces and combined them to make a composite pointer for use in the Little Synagogue. There it was used every Monday and Thursday for decades until it disappeared, presumed to have been lost or stolen during restoration work being done about 2004.

In 2012, a distinguished rabbi from the Upper West Side reached out to Rabbi Marc Angel, disclosing that an anonymous individual had requested to show a silver pointer to Shearith Israel. The dedication on the pointer had been

scratched off, but the name "Pool" remained discernible. Rabbi Angel recognized this pointer as the missing *Yad*. Because of this, the anonymous donor returned the *Yad* to our congregation, allowing it to be reinstated for use.

Through the generosity of Mr. Roy Zuckerberg, the Myers' Yad was expertly restored to its original form. We formally returned this special object to use in the synagogue on Parashat Mishpatim, in which we find the law of returning a lost object to its owner. It was solely due to an act of Hashavat Aveida that years later the pieces of a much older and more significant pointer crafted by Myer Myers could be identified, restored, and returned to ritual use.
