Wait Upon the Divine Cloud's Descent

The instructions to Aaron at the beginning of this section say that Aaron is not to come just at any time he chooses to the Sanctuary, but rather he must always follow a precise, proper decorum – that is, if Aaron and his living descendants are not to die as did his oldest sons Nadab and Abihu. There are many enigmas in these passages, but one particularly enigmatic statement made here is the detail that "for in the Cloud I shall manifest upon the [Ark's] Cover." The mention of this detail here seems offered as kind of an explanation of some of the other instructions, even though, of course, we already knew before in general that God manifested His Presence (at least by daytime) in the form of a Cloud which descended upon the Tabernacle.

The import of the mention of the Cloud as an explanation here would seem to be in a sense similar to the rules of decorum Queen Esther had to follow in meeting King Ahasuerus: On pain of death, it was only King Ahasuerus who could officially initiate the encounter. Similarly, Aaron cannot initiate the encounter, but must wait for the Cloud to manifest God's Presence and availability to receive Aaron, and only then, like Esther, if Aaron follows strict rules of protocol, dress and noble etiquette. Although the Sanctuary is where Man and God meet, only God can initiate, at least officially, although Man can and must prepare himself (like Esther) with propitiatory gifts for such a Meeting, should it please God to favor Man with such Occasion. Speculation might seem to suggest that in offering God "Strange fire" and uncommanded incense, Nadab and Abihu had attempted to initiate interaction with God by "conjuring up" some kind of "cloud" of divine presence, rather than waiting for God to initiate the "Cloud" of Divine Manifestation. This possible implication is left entirely unsaid. However, what is clear is that Aaron and his successors may not come to encounter God at any time they will, but only following the rules for Meetings and Encounters set by God. The simple clothes mentioned here for Aaron (unlike those mentioned elsewhere, for example) are humble as well as modest, and emphasize Aaron's humility, modesty, and submission before the Lord, rather than enticing God's Favor through more beautiful clothing.

Further on, these proper timings and procedures for offering sacrifices are contrasted with idolatrous practices of sacrificing animals, seemingly at any time anyone wanted, to any particular demon or god they wanted. I find the term (שעירים) (se'irim) used here for demons, as well as the same term used (perhaps intentionally), by contrast, to the he-goats offered in the recommended offerings to God, quite striking, at least in my imagination: This term for he-goat, as well as what seem to be billy-goat-like demons, always resonated in my linguistic and musical ear with the Greek term "satyr." (Or maybe it just resonates with my love of ancient farm animals and their lesser-known linguistic designations, like billy- and nanny-goats, ewes & rams, mutton, etc. And, needless to say, every time I come to a bridge I always paraphrase "Three Billy Goats Gruff," calling out "Troll Bridge – Gotta Pay the Troll!") Anyway, satyrs (but not trolls, unless they troll particular types of sites) and similarly-horned billy-goats do imply, shall we say, particular types of initiatory proclivities, (which proper Queens like Esther were banned from directly initiating, and in the Song of Songs, the noble Daughters of Jerusalem are also forsworn from directly initiating).

But metaphor aside, the implication is clear: In Divine Service, do not be headstrong! While in many aspects of life it can be important to seize the initiative like Joshua, Caleb, or Pinehas, in the Sanctuary the Priests are to play a more passive role. Their role is to be servants, and like servants they are to wait upon their masters, to be waiters (like my son at Talia's Steakhouse over Pesah). Perhaps they can coax somewhat with inducements, and they should be prepared with gifts and tributes to curry Divine Favor. But they must for the most part patiently await the Divine Spirit to descend and summon them first, coming readily when summoned, taking especial care to humbly follow the Divine Orders and decorum. Like a good wife, we are here taught how to patiently wait upon the Favor of the Divine Spirit.
