The Torah as Structure and Vocabulary for Expression

Therefore write yourselves this song and teach it to the children of Israel, put it in their mouths, so that this song may be a testimony to me among the children of Israel"

(Deut. 31:19)

Our former congregant David Klepper, who now lives in Jerusalem, wrote me last week, reminding me that I had taught him that the Torah is a song. The source for this concept comes from the Rabbinic exposition of the above verse. That exposition derives herein a commandment to write a Sefer Torah, understanding the "song" which Israel must write and must be "placed in their mouths" as referring to the entire Torah, rather than just the Haazinu or VeZot HaBerakha poetic sections which follow. David's correspondent Chris responded that he had heard of referring to the Psalms or the Song of Songs or other limited Biblical sections as songs, but had not heard of referring to the whole Torah or Tanakh as a song. As Chris put it: What a way to praise the Lord!

What do our Sages mean to convey in referring to the Torah as a song? Well, the Torah calls for leading a highly orchestrated life. Orchestrated as well as choreographed, for, as my first voice teacher taught me, song is not completely separable from dance. At times of year such as the one we are currently in, life is quite tightly orchestrated, with so much to do in such specific ways at such specific times, and we must take care to play our part at just the right time and not miss our cue. The Torah's orchestration and choreography is there to give our lives coherent and orderly structure. That type of structuring makes life stable and strong, shielding us from collapse.

And that structuring also serves as a basis for expression. Expression doesn't emerge out of a vacuum. Jazz artists "riff" off of familiar patterns, such as the "blues." All musical artists undergird their musical line with familiar scale or maqam patterns, harmonic patterns, and rhythmic patterns. And the same goes for dance, yoga, and martial arts: There are set optimal positions as well as set patterns of smooth and efficient movement. Expression is facilitated and enhanced through the incorporation of classic patterns, even when this is done unconsciously. There is an underlying grammar and structure to all expression, of course, but when the rules of such grammar are properly followed, the expression gains in grace, beauty, meaning, and depth.

The Torah and Halakha with their regular structure of prayer, laws, and observances were meant to be, as David puts it, "the lines and staffs of the music of my life."

Rabbi A.J. Heschel gave the spiritual advice that one should live one's life as if it was a work of art. But making unique and powerful expressions and art takes much training and practice. Even those who occasionally "break" the rules are usually just "playing" with them and are conscious of the underlying rules nonetheless. Our Hebrew lore and lifestyle, from the Bible to the Talmud to the medieval and modern halakhists and liturgy, can seem exhaustively long, especially at this time of year. But I believe it was deliberately left that way in order to give us a guiding structure and vocabulary for the most meaningful and wide-ranging expression.
