# Creating to Be Re-Generating

And God blessed the seventh day and declared it holy—for He ceased on it from all his labor which He had created to do. Such are the generations of heaven and earth when they were created.

When the LORD God made earth and heaven (Gen. 2:3-4)

The very strange word "to do" added at the end of the description of God's resting after all He created "to do" rather defies explanation. The reader gets the sense that the additional word kind of "finalizes" the creation story. It's as if we are being told that by the start of the seventh day God had completed creating "all that He had planned to do," and was therefore justified in resting. That's the sense I get from the usage here. The difference between "creating" and "making" or "doing" is rather slight, although "creating" is much more "out of the ordinary," as Cassuto notes. The two words in the preceding passages are used rather interchangeably. But the addition of the word here I do think gives the sense that God can rest from his unusual supernatural "creative" activities because all He planned to do has been done.

Yet wait a minute: Then the story continues with a retelling of much of the Creation story again in quite a different format as the "generations" or "history" of the Heavens and the Earth, as well as the "generation" of Man and Woman!" Indeed, there is a kind of linking of the end of verse 3 with verse 4 by means of these very same verbs: "These are the generations of the Heavens and the Earth 'when they were created, the day when made' the LORD God Earth and Heaven." And indeed, some Bible editions group Verse 3 with Verse 4, and our chapter headings clearly start Chapter 2 with the Sabbath rest section, clearly associating it with the "genealogy" which follows, unlike our Jewish division of aliyot. Indeed, Ibn Ezra gives an interpretation that does link the two verses: He seems to comment that God created a World which "does" on its own, which He created but is then self-perpetuating. In other words, God finished creating all He needed for the World to continue "to do" on its own, to re-generate on its own. Hence what follows is then told from the standpoint of the "generations" of the World afterwards: "A "history" of how the World, and especially Man,' came to be regenerating itself. Yes, there is some "creation" here, but it is geared to explaining how the World would be able to be perpetuated and regenerated. That's why the story of Man and his relationship as Steward of Creation and Woman as Man's Partner are told next.

I don't think Ibn Ezra literally thought that "to do" meant "to generate." I remember being taught in Hebrew school that the verb indicates that Man is meant to be a "partner" with God in creation. I've always thought that interpretation goes a little too far. But at the end of the Six Days of Creation story God does seem to have laid out a plan of what He wanted done and completed the task. It's a good lesson for us all: Lay out a task and complete it! We might found a business or a company, or even a family! But laying out the plans as to how the company can continue to operate after its basic founding, getting it to be self-sustaining and self-regenerating, well – that's another story, and needs to be planned for and told from another angle! This week we had two circumcisions of babies whose grandparents and earlier generations were members of our congregational community, and my hat is off to them! To create and realize a plan is one thing; to create in order that the "making "continues, to nurture and enable self-sustaining regeneration – that is truly a Divine Doing.
