When Success Must Be Guaranteed-Failure is Often Doomed

Although the final destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah appears in next week's reading, the set-up for it is in this week's. The story of Abram is very much entwined with the story of his nephew Lot, Lot's settling in Sodom and Lot's descendants' later settling in nearby Moab.

Abram's righteousness is from the very first contrasted with Sodom, whose people were "evildoers and sinners to the LORD, exceedingly." Although the episodes recounted here belonged in the ancient and legendary pre-history of Israel, Sodom and its fate were forever remembered, mentioned time and time again, becoming a byword for everything which was the exact opposite of the behavior expected of Abraham's progeny, Israel, and threatening Israel with the same fate as Sodom's.

Lot chooses to settle in the plain around Sodom because of the assurance of its prosperity and fertility which its location in a well-watered, irrigated plain gave it. Within that narrow but lush plain or vale, Lot could support as much livestock as Abram could on a range of Judaean and Samarian hilltops. But already in our Parasha, this seeming guarantee of prosperity turns into its very opposite, the foundation for its destruction and ruin. Abram emerges out of his hilltops as a prosperous as well as a valorous and respected prince, whereas Lot only narrowly escapes utter ruin because of his uncle. We are not told exactly what put originally these "Cities of the Plain" under the domination of the distant Mesopotamian kings, nor what made them rebel. However, it can be inferred that the same seeming "assurance" of their prosperity must have made them a prized target in the eyes of their enemies, as well as giving their own denizens an exaggerated overconfidence in their own wealth and potential power. Abram, by contrast, knows that he can and must rely upon God's reward for righteousness rather than upon purely material assurances of prosperity which are often false and indeed may be the very ticket to ruin. But Lot, and indeed all of Sodom, after barely surviving by the skin of their teeth, fail to heed the lesson, setting the stage for the cataclysmic devastation which follows in next week's episode. The salvation of Lot and Sodom by Abram in this week's Parasha is thus the prequel to God's salvation of Lot and wiping out of Sodom in next week's

The seemingly-assured nature of the prosperity of Sodom which its material wealth apparently gave it are the very sources of its curse and downfall. Abram had left the irrigated river-valley of the Euphrates and only lived in Egypt when famine gave him no other choice. Abraham and his descendants will live in the mountains and vales of Judea and Samaria where they will depend upon God directly for rain, rather than upon "dependable" material assurances for their prosperity. They will learn to look risk squarely in the eye, but that will teach them both coping skills for facing adversity as well as empathy for the poor and destitute among them who also face even more risk. Citizenries and societies which expect constant material guarantees of success quite often turn out more and more vile, evolving the most evil and idiosyncratic mores. Although Abram had no problem accepting rather questionable "gifts" from Pharaoh, he refused to keep the spoils of his military campaign in particular because he did not want to be known as beholden to as evil a place as Sodom, it seems.

What exactly the mores of Sodom which make them vile enough to warrant destruction is subject to conflicting interpretation, both in the Torah as well as in later prophetic books. The lack of clarity in detailing the particular sins seems to me deliberate. As a clergyman who has at times looked into trying to help the homeless, poor, and destitute strangers and even familiar brothers and sisters in our midst, I can attest to the arcane nature of the laws and mores our country and city has evolved, and how arcane requirements which try to guarantee safety for all often yield the opposite, creating more danger and risk for everyone, which then seeks rectification through yet another and more unnatural requirement and attendant procedure and etiquette. The cycle of risk-avoidance which the laws inculcate leads to predicaments and consequences which become more and more depraved. In short: Lot and his city's need for material guarantees of success becomes so addictive they cannot break away from their doom, even having experienced devastation once.
