Joseph's Return to Trust and Faith in Judah and Israel

What exactly is it that Judah says which finally makes Joseph break down? Interestingly, Judah never per se confesses for having suggested that Joseph be sold. It's actually quite remarkable the way Judah describes Joseph's disappearance in this Parasha: He quotes what his father Jacob said **about Joseph** "You know that my wife bore me two - one went away, and I said 'he has surely been torn to pieces, and I have not seen him since." Although it can be argued that this speech shows that Judah truly repented for selling Joseph, we find here no explicit confession from Judah for having sold his brother. Rather, Judah here seems to be continuing the same narrative the brothers gave about Joseph in the previous Parasha, that their twelfth brother "is not there (42:13)." That expression is ambiguous: It seems to imply that Joseph is dead, but doesn't say it outright, avoiding an explicit lie; their brother is somehow just "gone." Here too, it's quite glaring how Judah implies that Joseph is dead, but avoids saying what actually happened and avoids an outright lie (Judah doesn't say that he himself believes Joseph to be dead, when Judah himself knows there's a very good chance he could be alive in slavery somewhere in Egypt), rather quoting what his father Jacob had said about Joseph likely being dead. Hence it seems that it was not Judah's explicit confession of his remorse for his role in instigating and carrying out the sale of his brother which makes Joseph break down.

Of course, it could be argued that circumstances here and even later would not have allowed for a fuller admission of guilt, and that his was as close to an admission which could have been expected at the time. Only at the very end of Genesis, once Jacob has died, do the brothers ask formally for forgiveness from Joseph. And although there they do admit their sin against Joseph, there they actually engage in an outright lie, telling Joseph that their father Jacob had explicitly asked him to forgive them! The ostensible reason for the outright lie there, as well as the half-truths about Joseph's disappearance earlier, would seem to be the same: The brothers' fear of arousing up old angers and arousing wrath and retribution from as powerful a figure as Joseph. Better to let sleeping dogs lie! (which my AI defines as: "Best to leave a situation alone, especially if it's calm or settled, because interfering could stir up trouble, re-ignite old conflicts, or make things worse, advice against bringing up past problems or sensitive issues. It's about maintaining peace by not disturbing dormant conflicts). Indeed, I believe that when Judah says in the first verse of our Parasha "for you are even as Pharaoh" he indicates the extreme fear of Joseph which the brothers were under and how sensitively and diplomatically Joseph needed to be addressed. Hence an outright confession and asking for forgiveness was completely out of the question.

But what explicitly arouses Joseph's compassion towards his brothers and his break down into tears and reconciliation in our Parasha is Judah's feelings and concern for his father Jacob. This was combined, as well, with Judah's mention of Jacob's emotional connection with Benjamin, Joseph's full brother, which was such a "soul-to soul" connection that Jacob was liable to die if he were separated from Benjamin. Judah had perhaps had little concern with what Joseph's disappearance was going to do to his father - little concern with what Joseph's disappearance would do for the unity of the family and incipient nation of Israel. But now Judah realized that they all must stand together in family solidarity and brotherly unity and not sell out one brother for the sake of the others. Also, Jacob's concern for and connection to Joseph's full-brother Benjamin reminded Joseph about how much he, Joseph, still meant to Israel, that Joseph also was still connected to Jacob and to all of Israel in a "soul-to-soul" connection like Benjamin, and that without Joseph Israel was permanently reduced to severe mourning, "half-dead," as it were. Judah's newfound loyalty to his father Israel and with the rest of the brothers, including his potential rival Benjamin, and Israel's continued caring, loyalty, and faithfulness to his lost favorite son Joseph are what ultimately inspired Joseph's turn back to his brothers in compassion and a renewal of trust and faith.
