

Jacob's Laudation of the Children of Israel

I have written previously that Jacob's final address to his children partakes of the character of prophecy and blessing. But it also partakes of the character of praise, poetry, and song. We had a discussion of this point over breakfast: Baruch-Lev said that the address consists of curses, to which I agreed, but I explained that that I included curses under the category of blessings, for curses are, like blessings, invocations about the future regarding the favorability of Divine reception. Curses are "blessings in reverse." But I explained that Jacob's address also includes lyrical praise of his sons, to which someone responded "and put-downs," and Dr. Harry Engel interjected "back-handed compliments" and I responded that praise and denigration belong in this category of expressions of approval or disapproval of qualities in the present. I gave the example of Jacob's praise of Issachar as a "strong-boned ass, crouching among the sheepfolds," who evidently likes lying there so much that he gets lazy and ends up submitting to servitude. And Reuben is clearly lauded for his strength, even though that too at the end turns into disparagement of his arrogance. Of course, both strength and arrogance are included in the meaning of the Hebrew term Jacob uses here for strength, "עֹז". So Jacob's address is clearly intended as lyrical praise and laudation of the Tribes of Israel, even if also some lyrical disparagement and denigration is off-handedly included.

What is the point of such praise and poetry? This is a question I have been asking myself lately, as I have returned to my Jingle Bell Holiday Season practice of writing jingles to draw attendance at minyan, such as: "7:05 Shahrit today; Minha at 4:30; Your attendance at minyan helps keep our congregation sturdy!" One acquaintance of mine responded: "Let's face it, Walt Whitman you're not. Why not try a direct marketing approach?" To which I responded, "Marketing shmarketing, my approach has much more flair. Mundane expressions must be banished when it comes to prayer." My friend responded "It may have more flair, but does it bring in the crowds? How long did it take you to work out the rhyme for this last epistle?"

But this and other conversations with congregants in talking about minyan brings me to this very point, for our "prayers" are filled with little but lyrical laudations and praises, in high poetic style. The mystical power of lyrical words, in praise as well as mixed with some denigration, to bring out the best in the world we know is part of the whole point of the exercise. And it was to bring about the best in his sons' characters, that Jacob on his deathbed lauded to the Children of Israel.
